

The MAYOR would take no notice of such reports as they affected himself personally, did they not, at the present high prices of provisions, tend to create much discontent.

The Merchants and other Proprietors of Scales by not weighing Potatoes for any persons, would give valuable aid in checking Forestalling, as all would be then compelled to go to the Public Markets.

Thankful to his Fellow Citizens who so generally adopted his suggestion at the commencement of the winter, of using coals in lieu of turf, thereby rendering the latter article (although dear) not near so high as it was expected to be, he would now take the liberty of entreating, that acting on the same humane principle, those who can afford to buy Bread would permit as few potatoes as possible to be consumed in their houses, as they would thereby cause a very considerable diminution in the demand for this article in the markets, and consequently keep the prices within the bounds of moderation; exclusive of which, it is well known that Bread at all times, and especially in warm weather, is much more nutritious, particularly for those of delicate constitutions.
