the lofty and stern men that would differ from their nearest kindred, and dearest connexions, in vindication of what they thought to be their own sound and honest convictions of national policy, and public benefit. But let us seriously ask, do those "Independent Liberal Club" men understand the nature and character of our Representative system? Are such people even deserving of its protection? These factious talk of liberty, and independence! Do they know, or can they feel "that the lovers of freedom will be free." To differ in opinion upon a great constitutional question, is to forfeit the confidence of the Limerick Independent Club, and, forthwith, a gentleman of honor, and a useful senator, must quit his seat in Parliament, to make room for the son of Lord Somebody, who may happen to be patron of, or landlord of the Rev. Father that-body! What man of spirit, honor, virtue, learning—who that possesses the elements essential to adorn the Senate, and serve the people, will condescend to become their Representative, if he is to be reviled and calumniated, and run down by every furious fanatic, blind bigot, and political bully, for acting firmly and conscientiously in the performance of his public duty?

A member of the Commons House of Parliament should be a pillar of the Constitution, and not a political weathercock, to be shifted and turned by the belchings of every blustering demagogue.

The base, ungrateful, and sinister manifestations of the shabby and shallow members of the "Liberal and Independent" Club, have excited for him the sympathy of the whole County, and would, we are assured, secure him, if he could so humiliate himself, and injure the character of the County, as to yield to the insolence and ignorance of the paltry actors who exhibited on the Quinlan stage, a most strenuous support from a host of well tried and admiring friends, as well as the co-operation of new allies. But the experiment of the Lawless gang will be unavailing. Mr. O'Brien will, we trust, retain his seat, because he has the respect and confidence of the vast majority of his constituents. Let it be remembered their Representative is a gentleman—educated—enlightened—spirited—and independent; and, national though he be, has not descended from his proper position, to become a joint of a "tail," nor sunk in such mental, moral, and political degradation, as to be the slave of any man—the sycophant of any Leader; but his pride and patriotism, have earned for him the unrelenting animosity of an unfeeling despotism, which has frequently attempted to jostle him out of the popular orbit in which he moves with such honor to himself, and credit to his country.

But, with the great Edmond Burke, he may truly say—"I am sensible that no endeavors have been left untried to injure me in your opinion. But the use of character is to be a shield against calumny. I could wish, undoubtedly, (if idle wishes were not the most idle of things), to make every part of my conduct agreeable to every one of my constituents. In a discordancy of sentiments, it is better to look to the nature of things than to the humours of men. The very attempt towards pleasing every body, discovers a temper always flashy, and often false and insincere. Most certainly, it is our duty to examine—but it must be with discretion, with an attention to all the circumstances, and to all the motives; like sound judges, and not like cavilling petty-foggers and quibbling pleaders, prying into flaws, and hunting for exceptions. We must not be peevish with those who serve the people—for none will serve us whilst there is a Court to serve; but those who are of a nice and jealous honor, they who think every thing in comparison of that honor to be dust and ashes, will not bear to have it soiled and impaired by those for whose sake they make a thousand sacrifices to preserve it immaculate and whole; who shall either drive such men from the public stage, or shall send them to the Court for protection, where if they must sacrifice their reputation, they will at least serve their interest. None will violate their conscience to please us, in order afterwards to discharge that conscience which they have violated, by doing us faithful and affectionate service. If we degrade and deprave their minds by servility, it will be absurd to expect that they who are creeping and abject towards us, will ever be bold and incorruptible assertors of our freedom."

The letter of Joseph Hume, Esq. to his constituents at Kilkenny, will be read with the interest it deserves, and our County Club will derive from it that information of which they are either ignorant or heedless, as to the rights and duties of a Member of Parliament.

PETTY SESSIONS—YESTERDAY.

On the Bench the Mayor, Thos. P. Vokes, M. Gavin, Samuel Dickson, and Wm. Howly, Esqrs. Informations were ordered against Judith M'Carthy, for stealing a cloak belonging to Bridget Hayes; Mary Riely, charged by Messrs. Reddan, Ranelow, and Gammell, inspectors on the Turf-quay, with rioting at Arthur's-quay, was fined 10s. or two months' imprisonment. Anne Fitzgerald, for deserting her infant, annoying the establishment of Messrs. This comprises 13 electoral divisions, having a population of 71,036, and 290 guardians, together with nine ex-officio guardians, being a third of the number, and consisting of the resident Magistrates, making an entire board of 38. The number of acres to be assessed to the tithe survey was 115,746, and it was thought that a sum of 8½d. per acre would be sufficient for all the purposes. The Workhouse would afford accommodation for 700 paupers, and would be built on such a plan as to admit of considerable enlargement should it be found necessary at any future time. The expense of building, valuation, &c. would be about £6,350, which would be advanced by Government, and repaid afterwards in 20 instalments, making a sum of about £325 in each payment. Salaries would be £350 per annum, and it was calculated the support of each pauper would cost the Union 1s. 10d. per week.

On Thursday, Messrs. Hawley and Burke, Poor Law Commissioners, held, in the Court House of Ennistimon, a meeting, for the purpose of explaining the nature and operations of the act, the Venerable Archdeacon Whitty presiding. The meeting was attended, amongst others, by Thomas Morony, Esq. J.P. Miltown House; Francis M'Namara, Esq. J.P. Arran View; Francis G. Morony, Esq. J.P. Sea View; John M'Namara, Esq. J.P. Molloy; George Comyn, Esq. Holywell, &c. &c. The Assistant Commissioners having given every explanation required, and submitted their plan of the proposed Union of Ennistimon, a vote of thanks was unanimously passed to them, and Thomas Morony, Esq. J.P. of Miltown House, being called to the chair, the usual vote of thanks was voted to the Venerable Archdeacon for his conduct, not only on this, but on all occasions when the cause of charity required his aid. Messrs. Hawley and Burke arrived in this city late on Thursday night, having, during the preceding days, travelled through a great part of the Western portion of the county of Clare.

The Fellowship Examination at Trinity College is going on since Wednesday morning. Nine Candidates, and only two Fellowships will be filled up. The Candidates are—Messrs. Moran, Athwell, Booth, Crampton, M'Dowell, Davis, Lee, (son of the late Rev. Wm. Lee) Badham, Jellett. Examination on Wednesday forenoon—Logics, Dr. M'Donnell; best answerers, Moran, and Athwell. Afternoon—Professor M'Culloch; best answerers, M'Dowell, and Lee. Thursday morning—Physics, Professor Lloyd; best answerers, Booth, and M'Dowell. Afternoon—Ethics, Doctor Singer; best answerers, Moran, M'Dowell, and Lee, equal. M'Dowell and Lee are sure of Fellowships. Yesterday the Examinations were in Chronology, History, Greek, Latin, and Hebrew. The answering has not been as great as was expected. Monday the election will be declared. The examinations are attended by the Bishop of Cashel, Judge Crampton, Dr. Hart, and Dr. Hincks, late Fellows, who take a lively interest therein.

It was expected by the perpetual curate, who is officiating in one of the parishes attached to the Deanery of Achonry, that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners would have recommended some augmentation to his income to have been made from a sinecure prebend that constitutes a part of the crops of the deanery; but such was the hurry to have Mr. Hoare instituted, that the Lord Lieutenant never submitted the deanery to the commissioners, to know whether they would recommend the union to be continued or altered in any way. Every dignity or prebend in the gift of a bishop must be submitted; but it is not necessary that those in the gift of the Crown should undergo that ordeal, although hitherto such has been the practice. There is much difference between men writing and declaiming on the abstract principle of reform, but practically omitting to do any thing when opportunity occurs.

The annual meeting of the Kildare-place Education Society took place on Wednesday, Henry Hamilton, Esq. in the chair, when W. B. Rutherford, Esq. Secretary, read the report, which indicates that the operations of the Society, though necessarily limited, are still carried on with undiminished activity. The model schools were never more prosperous or efficient.—Number of schools in connexion, 1097, and 81,178 pupils. Roman Catholic children still attend in great numbers. A deputation is to visit England next month in behalf of the Society, and the best success is anticipated by their appeal.

The living of Clane is conferred on the Rev. Wm. Kenna, of Ballynegan, near Athy; he has a wife and 14 children. The *quare impedit* is yet pending.

The Ecclesiastical Commissioners have made no reduction in the rent-charge of the new Dean of Achonry; there are 1500 Protestants in his parish.

A memorial numerously signed by the Protestant inhabitants of Miltown Malbay, having been presented to the Lord Bishop of Killaloe, complaining of the absence of the Incumbent for a great portion of the winter, that active and zealous Prelate deemed it his duty, at once to proceed to that parish, and in person to inquire into the complaint. On Whitsunday, (there being no minister in attendance,) the Prelate himself officiated, and preached to a large congregation, and subsequently administered the Holy Sacrament to a number of communicants, going thro' the whole service with a pious energy worthy of imitation. His Lordship has promised the inhabitants redress by sending a zealous servant of the Lord, to this neglected portion of Christ's flock. In the evening he left Miltown for Kilrush, where he again preached to a crowded congregation.—(Communicated.)

There is to be a meeting at Cork, on Friday, to promote the Additional Curates' Fund Society.

An union is contemplated between the Synod of Ulster and Secession Synod, and for which several congregations in the North have made overtures.

At the opening of the new Presbyterian Chapel, Dundalk, when Dr. M'Leod, of Glasgow preached, there was a collection of £196. The collectors were all *Episcopalian*s, led by the Rev. Mr. Thackeray, Rector of Dundalk.

The Right Rev. Dr. Ryan has appointed the Rev. John Clarke, his Chaplain, to be Parish Priest of St. John's, in this city.

Dr. Murdoch, R. C. Bishop of Glasgow, is a member of the Precursor Society there. The Precursor Rent at the meeting in Dublin this week, was £327.
