Monday last a country boy was attracted at Cappa-
more mountain by two dogs in his company, which

body. The boy, in alarm, came into town yesterday,
and reported the matter to Thomas P. Vokes, Esq., at
the Police office, who immediately sent out some of
his force, who found the dead body of a man whom
they ascertained to have been Bryan Noonan, a ser-
vant of William Butler, who had been missing some
months, and for whose discovery Government then
ffered a large reward. He had been suspected in the
country of giving information of the murder of Messrs.
Cooper and Weyland, for which it is now apparent he
was himself sacrificed, and privately buried in a lonely
part of Cappamore mountain.
