TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

 SIR,—Returning you thanks for the impartial report given in your valuable Journal of the 14th instant, of my evidence in the ejection case, Russell a Russell, I have now to request the insertion in your columns of the following letter, addressed to the Editor of the Limerick Standard, which letter has been refused publication in that paper.
 I am, Sir,

 To the Editor of the Limerick Standard.
 July 15, 1839.
 "Sir,—Having seen in your paper of the 13th inst. a report purporting to be that of the Ejection Case, Wm. Russell a. Francis P. Russell, in which many things are stated which are not true, and many others in which truth is so perverted, as to leave all the mischievous effect of falsehood, may I beg of you to insert the following correction of the statements therein contained, which, if not contradicted, would tend to create injurious, though erroneous impressions of my conduct on the public mind.
 "1stly.—You report Mr. Bennett to have stated that a lease was made by the late William Russell to the late John Russell. Mr. Bennett made no such statement, the lease having been granted to the late Mr. John Tuthill.
 "2ndly.—You report me to have stated that two offers were made for the premises in dispute by Messrs. Murphy and Rogger of £100 fine, and £36 per annum rent, and that I set them to Mr. F. P. Russell, the defendant, for £127 fine, and but £30 rent. Now, as I truly advised, the offers made by Messrs. Murphy and Rogger, were only £30 rent, and £100 fine, so that I, for the benefit of the minors set the premises to Mr. F. P. Russell, as the highest bidder.
 "3rdly.—You report me to have stated that I accounted for everything, but the Rent. You could scarcely have so misunderstood me; I am sure no other person in Court did. I stated that I accounted yearly with Mrs. William Russell for every thing, except the Rent in question, namely, that of the Premises held by F. P. Russell; I also explained that Mr. Russell was not bound by his proposal to pay this Rent until he should get his lease, which the then Lord Chancellor, Hart, decided, while he regretted I had not the power to make. The Bill to obtain this leasing power was drawn up by my late brother's attorney, Mr. James Guthrie Russell, under the advice and opinions of Counsellors Saurin and Waring.
 "4thly.—You report me to have stated that I paid to Alderman Russell, a sum of £600, due by F. P. Russell, and charged same to account of the minors. This I never asserted—the debt, as I stated, having been due of the late Wm. Russell, the minors' father. I, as his executor, of course discharged. Any person reading your report, would suppose I misapplied the property left to my care by my late brother; and it much surprises me, that while you give at great length Mr. Bennett's statements, you totally omit Mr. Henn's reply, in which my management of the minors' property was shewn to the satisfaction of a crowded Court to have been for their benefit. This omission you will scarcely call candid.
 "You also have endeavoured, for what reason I cannot conceive, to make any evidence on that trial appear in a ludicrous light. My statements were plain and simple, and called for no exhibition of merriment, and the roars of laughter, which you state were occasioned by them, were really caused by Mr. Bennett's puns.
 "The only reparation you can make for the above mentioned misrepresentation, is to give this correction the same publicity which you gave them.
