We hear great complaints made by the emigrants per *Patina* of their treatment during the voyage, nine deaths have occurred, among which were three children of Mr. and Mrs. Reed—the whole of their family. We have not yet ascertained the names of the others.—*Southern Australian*.

THE ALIQUIS—This vessel, which arrived on Saturday last from the Cove of Cork, has brought 295 emigrants. They are at present in good health, but had been afflicted during the passage out with ophthalmia, which, however, has not been attended with any serious effects. There were six deaths, two females in child-birth and four children; and four children born. The captain and the first and second officers had a sort of misunderstanding in the early part of the voyage, which might have probably led to unpleasant consequences, but for the proper interference of the emigrants. The entire of the crew are lodged in the Emigrants' Buildings, Bent-street, and wait engagements—65 are agriculturists and the remainder tradesmen.

The ship *John Barry*, Robson, from Sheerness, arrived on November 17, with 320 male prisoners, Campbell Francis, Esq. R.N. superintendent. The guard consists of Lieut. Somerset, 51st Regt. Ensign Grimes, 50th Regt. 30 rank and file of the 50th and 51st Regts. There are 7 women and 7 children attached to the military. Passenger—Mr. Colin Spaldin, of the Engineer department.

Robert Stevens was killed by Wm. Fitzpatrick, in consequence of some words respecting Stevens' dislike to Munster men.

Mrs. Fishburne died suddenly, whilst walking the streets.

Two official characters absconded from Port Philip, on the first of March.

Messrs. Stephen and Rogers, two lawyers, to prevent a duel, are each bound over in the sum of £500.

Messrs. Brown, Jeffrey Amos Eager, Budd and Wilkinson have commenced a newspaper at Launceston.

Mr. Alfred Stephen is appointed a Judge.

An Italian opera company is expected in the colony.

William Furlong, Robt. R. Leake, a son of Colonel Watson, John M'Farlane, and E. J. Eyre, have realised large fortunes within a short time, by trafficking in sheep.

The barque *Children* has been lost near Cape Nelson, the captain and eighteen of the crew and passengers were drowned.
