Royal African Corps, Assistant-Surgeon Campbell, 1st
India Regiment, Quartermaster Mew, 67th,
and family, Staff Assistant-Surgeon Wood, four Ser-
jeants, and 11 rank and file of the 74th Regiment,
arrived by the *Numa* from the West Indies.
Capt. Barbor, Inniskilling Dragoons, was robbed of
a valuable Turquoise breast pin in Dublin, by a pen-
sioner.

The last of the 34th Depot, under Capt. Norris,
arrived at Cork, has arrived at Chatham, per the *Avon*
steamer.
The 19th Depot companies, under Major Hay, leave
Dublin, on Monday, for the Pigeon-House.
Private William Hemming, Royal Marines, received
a hundred lashes at Woolwich, last week, for deser-
tion with necessaries.
The Duke of Wellington again advises that her Majes-
ty's forces ought to be augmented in all parts of her
dominions.

Lieut.-General Sir John Keane, on the Staff in
India, has been ordered by her Majesty the decoration
of G.C.B.
A new situation is created in the Irish Police force,
that of Surgeon to the whole establishment of 8000
men—something about £1000 a year salary.
The Royals, at Edinburgh, and 78th, at Glasgow,
changed quarters this week.
The Depot 43d at Naas, have detached two compa-
nies to Newbridge, to replace the Inniskilling Dra-
goons, gone to Dublin.

The 47th Depot, under Major Dundas, landed at
Belmont, Jersey, this week, left to-day for Beltur-
t, detaching two companies to Cavan.
Major-General John Grey has received the insignia
of a Knight of the Royal Portuguese Military Order
of the Tower and Sword, and of a Knight Commander
of St. Bento d'Avis, for his conduct during the Penin-
sular war, especially in the action of El Bodon.

Lieut. Jenkins, 5th, from Corfu, has joined the
34th Depot at Galway.
The depot companies 53d and 75th embark in the
Collo at Kingston, for Plymouth.

Lieut. Magee, 45th has succeeded Lieut. Robinson,
in the recruiting duty at Norwich.
The brass band of the 83d Depot of Derry, has
been discontinued playing on the Sabbath.
The 8th Hussars on landing at Liverpool from
Ireland, proceeded on direct by railroad carriages to
Manchester.

The 38th Depot at Newry, replaced the 8th Hussars
at Dundalk yesterday.

Thursday, as the soldiers of the 97th Regiment
were practising on the strand, near Irishtown, Dublin,
a musket of one of the men burst, and lacerated his
hand in a serious manner.
The 60th Rifle Depot, 1st Bat. under Major Treve-
na, leave Dublin, on Monday, for Birr, relieving
Capt. Caldwell's company, 92d, at Maryboro.

The Cheshire Yeomanry are called out for active
duty, and to attend the trial of Parson Stephens in
City for sedition.
Thursday evening, the *Revenge*, 78 guns, arrived
at Cove, with three companies of the 84th Regiment.
The *Revenge* is commanded by the Hon. Captain
Maldegrave, and is to remain at Cove until her com-
mencement of men is complete—she requires over 100,
which it will be difficult to procure at present.

At Cashel Petty Sessions, two men were fined for
encroaching land on the property of Major-General Sir
Hugh Gough, one in the sum of £27, and the other
£16.

The *Great Western* steamer arrived at Bristol on
Wednesday last, in twelve days and a-half from New
York, having set out an hour before the other steam
ship, the *British Queen*, whom she left behind. The
Annapolis were tranquil. The *Athol* had reached Quebec
from Cork, with drafts from 1st 15th 24th 32d and 85th
Regts. The officers who went out are Capt. Davenport,
Lieut. Webster, 1st; Capt. Western, Lieut. Astell,
and Ensign Wilkinson, 15th; Brevet Major Stoyte,
Lieuts. Blachford and Spring, Ensign Wodehouse,
15th; Brevet Major Swinburn, Capt. Hill, Lieut.
and Ensign Robyns, 32d; Lieut. Grant, and
Ensign Knox, 85th. The yellow fever continued to
wax with unabated fury in Havana and the southern
provinces. Permanent barracks are to be built at Lapraire.
Martello towers are to be erected at Montreal.
Fort Wellington, at Prescott, is to be completed.
Lighting Island is to be fortified, and Government
purchased land in various parts of the suburbs of
Kingston, with a view to works for its defence on a
very large scale.

Mr. John Franklin, of the Police, with his party,
erected in the mountains of Cumner, on Thursday
night, a notorious character of the name of Patrick
Mahahan, a deserter from the 10th Hussars, on his
being nearly three years. He is to be sent off forth-
with to his regiment.

John Browne, Esq. of Brownestown, Mayo, riding a
people chase at Kiltormagh, on Tuesday, with Mr.
Ollingbrook, of Oldcastle, fell with his horse, which
rolling over the rider, was killed on the spot, under
one of the fences, and Mr. Browne was taken up in
such a condition that his family entertain the worst
apprehensions for his life. Mrs. Browne was a spec-
ator of the casualty.

Thomas Morrissy, escaped from Athy gaol this week
by leaping from the prison wall, 25 feet high.

nightfall with a loaded car, on which were two
barrels of groceries for Dr. Bishop, of Kinsale.
When he had got about three miles from the city he
was attacked by three men—one of them presented a
pistol at his head, when another knocked him down
and rifled his pockets. They then took the hamper.
The wool did not exceed £1 1s. 6d. at the late fair of
Roserea.

The arrivals of foreign wheat last week to London
were 36,000 quarters, to Liverpool 6,000 quarters.
There has been a very large importation of foreign
wheats, full 58,000 quarters.

Surgeon J. Delany is elected to the Whitegate
Dispensary, Kilkenny.

On Thursday, Dr. Russell was elected Physician to
the Castle-Connell Dispensary, in place of Dr.
Beardon, resigned.

The Rev. R. Henry, P.P. has recovered a bank parcel
of £23, which had been transmitted from Castle-
bar for the branch of the Bank of Ireland at Westport,
last June.

Father Mathew, of Cork, was last week on a visit
with his brother at Castlake, near Cashel. The
moment his location was ascertained, hundreds of
people flocked to his reverence; but Father Mathew
refused to receive them, as unless they came to him
in Cork, he would not render them any service.

Lord Carew has given £100 towards building a
Chapel at Passage and Dunmore. His Lordship's
eldest son came of age last week.

A meeting was held at Kilrush, on yesterday, for
the nomination of guardians. The election is fixed
for the 28th inst. The meeting was addressed by Mr.
Hawley, who, in a lucid and able manner, explained
the duty of the guardians, and the propriety of re-
turning proper persons to fill the office, and expressed
a hope that party feeling should not operate in their
selection. Counsellor Fitz-Gerald, the Rev. Michael
Comyn, and Charles O'Connell, Esq. also addressed
the meeting. The latter gentleman reprobated, in
strong terms, the election of the ex-officio guardians.
The thanks of the meeting were then voted to Mr.
Hawley, Assistant Commissioner, for his exposition of
the act. Every one of the electoral divisions will be
contested.

Mr. Burke, Assistant Commissioner, will form a
Poor Law Union at Tuam, on Tuesday.

Mr. Otway, Assistant Poor Law Commissioner, will
attend at Bailieborough, Cavan, the 29th inst. to
explain the arrangements for the formation of a union
in the parishes of Killinkere, Bailieborough, Shercock,
Enniskeen, and Moybolgue.

MALLOW UNION.—A meeting of Guardians took
place at Mallow on Monday last, when the late deci-
sion of making Mallow the seat of the workhouse was
rescinded, and Thursday, the 12th of September next,
was agreed on as the day for finally fixing on the site,
when it is expected all the Guardians of the Union
will attend. The Poor Law Commissioners have
lately had it in contemplation to disserve the pa-
rishes of Charleville, Kibbolane, and Liscarroll
from the Union, however the Guardians of the Nor-
thern portion of it have refused their sanction to that
plan, as it would increase the tax on the remainder.
A short time after the Union was formed the parish
of Kilsanig was added to it, and Tullisce taken away;
and now that the disservice of Charleville, Kibbolane
and Liscarroll has been mooted, after the lapse of
some months, the people in the North, naturally
anxious that Buttevant should be made the centre,
conceive that those arrangements have been contem-
plated in some quarter, for the purpose of making
Mallow the most eligible situation for the workhouse;
for if things stood as they are at present, any intelli-
gent person, unconnected with the interests of the
Union, would have little difficulty in correctly decid-
ing between the two rival towns.

The Mayor, President of the Magisterial Bench.

Patrick Keane, and Patrick Daly, were fined 2s. 6d.
each, or 24 hours' imprisonment, for being drunk in
the streets; Catherine Hogan was fined 2s. 6d. for
assaulting Bridget Fitzgibbon; Judith Hogan fined
5s. for assault on Mary Prenderville; informations
ordered against John Ryan, for unlawfully detaining a
car belonging to Patrick Ryan; against Michl. Kett,
for assault on James Ryan. Mr. Wm. Molony sum-
moned the toll collector of the Wellesley Bridge, for
overcharging his drivers. It appeared that a carriage
and four horses passed over the bridge, for which a
deposit of one shilling was paid to the defendant, but
the person to whom the carriage was going having
subsequently paid the custom, the drivers on their
return demanded the shilling they first paid, but
were refused it—the collector insisting that as they
returned without the carriage, they should pay for the
horses. The Bench inflicted a fine of 1s., but Mr.
Russell, to whom the tolls are let for £750 a-year ap-
pealed to the decision, by the advice of his law agent,
Mr. Monsell, who considered the collector had only done
his duty under the Act of Parliament. Four factory
apprentices belonging to Mr. Lloyd, were sentenced
to 14 days imprisonment for absenting themselves
from work; Margaret Finn was fined 2s. 6d. and
bound to keep the peace, for assaulting Frances
Hennessy.
