The Poor Law Guardians of the Limerick Union, anticipating that the Municipal Reform Bill would pass into law this Session, and come into operation forthwith, re-called their valuator from the rural districts, in order to assess the property in this City; but now finding their premature expectations disappointed, the Board of Guardians are summoned to meet this day, in order to send their officer back again into the suburban districts, to complete the valuation before winter sets in, and from which more important and arduous duty he had been abruptly called away.
