FATAL CASUALTIES.—Saturday evening a boy of the name of Ferguson, about twelve years old, while stooping over the verge of the river to avoid a stone which another was throwing into the water at Harvey's-quay, fell in, and though taken up in five minutes after, life was extinct.

On Sunday, about twelve o'clock, some boys were playing in a sand cot which was moored in the Abbey river, and through some awkward movement three of them fell out, two of whom were saved, but the third, named Cahill, son of humble parents, was instantly carried off by the stream under Baal's Bridge. He was observed to rise several times, but so violent was the current at the moment that no assistance could be rendered him, though some hundreds were looking on, and he sunk for the last time opposite Barrington's Hospital.

Same day, and about the same time, a young girl named Margaret Butler, fell from the window of a house, two story high, in the lane off Lower Glentworth-street, into a small flagged yard, and her brains were literally dashed out. It is supposed that in stretching out of the window for linen which was drying, she overbalanced herself, as nobody observed the accident until a woman, who heard the fall, found the body on the ground. The Mayor held an inquest. Verdict—"Accidental death"
