On the 6th inst. in his 27th year, Gage George Canny, Esq. Captain 99th Regt. after an illness of thirty-six hours. He is deeply and deservedly regretted by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was son of Matthew Canny, Esq. of Violet Hill, near this City, and a nephew of General Hall. Yesterday, at her house, in George's-street, Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Robert Carr, Esq. of the Garden, in this City, and sister of the late William Carr, Esq. James White, Minister of the Bethel Chapel, Kingstown. At Enniscorthy, Wm. Squirrel, Esq. late Captain 94th Regt. On Saturday evening, at Cooper Hill, near this City, in the prime of manhood, James Archdeacon, Esq. formerly Lieut. and Adjutant of the 84th Regt. His death was awfully sudden. He had taken a drive in the morning, and appeared throughout the day in excellent health and spirits. After dinner, while conversing with a friend, (Mr. Thomas Graydon,) he suddenly exclaimed, "Oh Thomas! Thomas!" and fell on the ground a lifeless corpse. The deceased possessed an intelligent and well furnished mind. Honorably upright in principle, amiable and generous in disposition, polite and courteous in behaviour, warm and cheerful in conversation, he gained the esteem and love of a very extensive circle of friends, by whom his loss is as deeply regretted, as his memory will be fondly cherished. The opposition which has been going on for over two years on the Cork river, ceased on Saturday last; all parties having joined their steamers under one management. Fergus O'Connor has returned to Cork from his Charist agitation in England. Charles Carthy, suspected of the murder of Police Sergeant Lawlor, has absconded from Cork, and is supposed to have sailed for Swansea. Groves' Diorama from this city has opened in Cork. The County Cork Agricultural Association offer two challenge cups for best bull and ram at the show on the 25th inst. Mr. O'Connell, striving to induce a liberal registry in Kerry, tells the farmer, "It is not material to a Poor Law rate-payer whether the charge upon the land be upon a higher or a lower scale. I will make this plain to every one of you. Recollect, in the first place, that there is a fixed sum to be raised, and that sum will not be more or less whether the land be valued high or low; for example, if land be valued at £6 a year, the rate will be one shilling in the pound, or six shillings—but if on a higher scale that land is valued at £12 a year, the rate will be only six pence in the pound, or, in other words, the same sum, six shillings. There is, therefore, no reason why the elector should not register his vote—he will not have to pay one penny more on that account."
