Kelly, Esq sworn—I know the prisoners at the bar; there was one of them (David Hayes) in my employment in July last; about the middle of August, there were two chests and a box of tea stolen from the approved Queen's stores; the value of the tea without duty would be £20, and with the duty £50; the tea was consigned to me by Mr. Roberts; search was made for the tea, and I asked Hayes if he knew anything about, if he did to tell me of it; I had no suspicion whatever of Hayes himself, as I always placed confidence in him; he told me " he knew no more of it than the child unborn;" I again told him a second time not to conceal from me who the guilty person was, and he then said, "It was I stole it, and the devil prompted me to do so;" he also told me that the way in which he came at the tea was by leaving the door open where it was, and giving up the keys, as if he had locked up; from more information Cornet Milbank, Scots Greys, and Lieut.
