W. Beckett, Esq. is appointed Lieut.-Colonel of the Yorkshire Hussar Yeomanry Cavalry, vice York resigned; Hon. H. Lascelles to be Major; H. T. Thompson, Esq. to be Captain; J. H. Smyth, Esq. Lieutenant, and H. Willoughby, jun. Cornet.

The Duke of Wellington reviewed the 11th Light Dragoons at Canterbury, on Wednesday.

The 84th Regiment was raised in 1793, and have been ever since on foreign service with the exception of eight years. General Maclean, the veteran Colonel of the Regiment, entered the service in 1787, as Ensign in the 29th.

Two privates of the 7th Fusiliers were brought up at the Police-office, Cork, on Wednesday, for knocking down Sheriff Harris in the street the night before. They were handed over to the Military authorities for punishment.

A letter from the 70th Regiment at Grenada states that Lieut.-Col. Kelsall, Capt. Morphy and Brown, were in fever, and the death of two subalterns was reported.

Lieut.-Col. Angelo has resigned the office of Commissioner of the Bolton Police, salary £500.

Sir Charles Shaw commands the new Police at Manchester, numbering 450 men.

Lieut. Leech and a party of Royal Engineers, are arrived in Waterford, for the purpose of making the Ordnance Ordnance Survey of that city and neighbourhood. They are quartered in the Artillery barracks. The map of the city is to be upon a large scale.

The Amateur Theatricals came off on Thursday night at Plymouth, with great eclat. The address on the re-opening of the theatre was spoken with much spirit by Sir Henry Blackwood. The principal Military performers were Capt. Pison, 85th Regt., Lieut. Whitmore, 1st Royals, Capt. Browne, 85th Regt., Lieut. Bristow, 25th Regt., Ensign Claremont, 1st Royals, Ensign Verner, 53d. Regt. and Capt. Charritie, E. I. C. S., Lieut. Philpotts, R.N. Mr. Macdonald, 25th. (the celebrated Rory O'Moore,) declined to take any part. The pieces selected for the evening were, "You can't marry your Grandmother," "Spitfire," and "Frightened to Death." In the first, Sir Henry Blackwood was quite at home as the "Footman," and Mr. Whitmore electrified the house by his admirable personification of "Tom Small." In the second, Capt. Charritie, R.N. was the life of the piece as "Bob Stay." Mr. Philpotts, R.N. fully sustained his reputation, in the character of "Mr. Shortcut." In the third piece, Capt. Pison enacted the part of the "Dead Man" with his usual vigour; Lieut. Bristow was a delightful "Col. Bluff," and Mr. Fiske, (late of the 94th Regt.) displayed the originality and versatility of his talents, in the character of "Mumps." The audience, which was overflowing, and comprised the elite of the three towns, including the Naval and Military circles, expressed themselves highly gratified with the evening's entertainments.

The *Agula*, Sardinian corvette, 22 guns, has been the last week in Plymouth Sound, on her return from the Baltic. The Officers were hospitably entertained at Government and Admiralty House, and by all the Regiments stationed at Plymouth.

In the event of Bilbao, in Spain, being garrisoned by British troops, the 1st. Battalion of the Royal Regiment will be sent on that service.

Captain Reeves' company 99th, is at Drogheda.

The 25th Regiment will not leave England before the month of March. The *Apolo* (Karley, master,) will convey the 7th Fusiliers from Cork to Gibraltar, and the 81st and 82nd Regts. from thence to Jamaica and the Windward Islands.

Ensign Lindsell, 25th Regt. will immediately obtain his Lieutenancy (vice Lieut. Long, 1st. Royal Dragoons, who exchanges and retires.) This promising young officer (Mr. Lindsell) joined in Limerick garrison.

The division of the Ordnance Survey, under Lieut. Fenwick. R. E. has marched from Portarlington to Templemore. The head-quarters under Major Waters, R. E. will remain at Portarlington until the survey of the county of Cork shall be commenced in spring.

Majors Gordon and Hardinge's companies, 3d Bat. Royal Artillery, embark on board the Rattlesnake troop-ship, on Tuesday next, for Ceylon.

The Rev. E. Pomeroy Brooke, who has been appointed to the Rectory of Drumgolane, Dromore, was formerly a Captain in the 62d Regiment.

Lieut. Ormsby shortly succeeds to a company in the 88th by purchase.

Capt. Fraser, 35th Regiment, is on a visit to his father, Lieut.-Col. Fraser, in the garrison of Jersey.

Adam Mitchell, gunner of the Royal Artillery at Elizabeth Castle, Jersey, fell into the moat and was drowned, while striving to gain his quarters after gaitfall.

The Magistrate, Allen, with troops for Bombay, has set out to Plymouth leaky, with pumps choked, cargo rife, ballast shifted.

Colonel McGregor, Inspector-General of Police, has nominated to Mr. P. Browne, that he must either reside at Sligo, or resign his situation of Paymaster of the mstabulary for the counties of Leitrim and Sligo. It appears that Mr. Browne has held the incompatible situation of paymaster of the constabulary for two counties, collector of cess for a barony in Roscommon, and returning officer for the poor law union of Boyle.

Col. Holmes, Deputy Inspector General of Police, inspected the Constabulary force in this City, under command of Chief Constable Clements, and announced them to be the best looking, and best pointed detachment he had seen on his provincial tour.

For a wager of £200 to run ten miles in one hour and twenty minutes, Lieut. Tuite, of the 19th Regt. in Dublin garrison, accomplished the pedestrian feat this week at the Phoenix-park, within one hour, ten minutes and 35 seconds of the time, and covering the full mile of the task in five minutes and a half.

Col. Torrens, the emigration agent, has written a reply to the letters of Mr. Shanran Crawford, in defence of the small farmers of Ireland. The Colonel, it is known, argues in favour of emigration, and the consolidation of farms; and he now says that Mr. Crawford's letters, instead of being called a "defence of the small farmers of Ireland," should be styled a defence of the impoverishment of the small farmers of Ireland, with a proposal of perpetuating the same.

The Police stations in the City of Cork and suburbs are to be increased from five to eleven, in consequence of the late atrocious murder, by an augmentation of twenty infantry, and twenty mounted police.

A most melancholy event occurred in the Queen's County last week, produced by the despotic power that Roman Catholic Priests are using to make the wretched farmers register. The tenant of Mr. Bland, of Blendford, named M'Evoy, was placed in such an unpleasant situation at the last election, having been coerced to vote against his landlord, that he determined he should never again have an opportunity of voting against his wishes. His spiritual adviser was not satisfied with the reason that the unfortunate man gave for disobeying him. To such a state of phrenzy was M'Evoy then goaded by solicitations to register, that the unfortunate man both cut his throat and hung himself! His brother swore at the inquest that the uneasiness of the unhappy man was occasioned by the influence of the priest upon his mind. Blendford is near Abbeyleix.

Farrell Kiernan, of Cloon, Leitrim, one of the lately chosen Poor Law Guardians, is committed to Cavan gaol for Ribbonism, by Mr. Little, Stipendiary Magistrate. Brady, the Ribbon publican, arrested at Cavan, was also a Poor Law Guardian!

Mr. Torrens, son of Col. Torrens, attended a meeting at Loughrea to promote emigration to South Australia, when Mr. Birmingham advised a purchase of 4000 acres there, and Sir John Burke subscribed £200, the Dowager Lady Clanricarde, £100. Mr. Torrens goes out as a settler next December.

Eighty head of fat cattle were killed on yesterday at Mr. Francis P. Russell's slaughter-house, for account of Mr. William Dunbar, provision merchant.

Four sheep were killed on the lands of Carrigparson, in this county, on Tuesday night.

Mr. Howly discharged several pauper debtors from custody at Clonmel sessions.

Mr. O'Connell is to attend a public dinner at Mallow on Tuesday next.

Crofton M. Vandeleur, Esq. is expected at Kilrush next week, when the site for a Union work-house will be decided on.

We are pleased to learn that our fellow-citizens, Messrs. Mullock & Sons, Ship-brokers, have been appointed Agents to the Northern Insurance Clubs, including the Star, Wear, Britannia, Marine, Neptune, Equitable, at Sunderland; and to the General Association at Scarborough. Such appointment will give general satisfaction.

John Ryan was murdered in the town of Nenagh by a man of the name of Mara, who is in custody.

There was a brisk fair for horned cattle and sheep, at Bruff, yesterday. Lord Guillemore sold 20 Bulls, at £16 10s. each; Joseph Gubbins, Esq. 20 Cows, at £13. and 20, at £11 15s.; George Gubbins, Esq. 14, average £10 15s.; Henry O'Grady, Esq. 22, average £15; Jerh. Shine, Esq. 8, at £15 12s. 6d.; Robert H. Ievers, Esq. 20, at £12; John Barry, Esq. 20, at £16. The price of Mutton has declined.

An orphan child, four years old was burnt to death on Sunday evening, in a house at Killeen, near Newport, the inmates being out and no person within but a child younger. An inquest was held on the body by Mr. Carroll, Coroner, on Tuesday. Verdict accordingly.

We are informed there was no breach or violation of the temperance pledge by a member of Rev. Mr. Mathew's society at Newport, as reported, the truth being that the man who exhibited there as a pretended convert and subsequent backslider, had not gone farther than Charleville on his way to Cork, and had never been a member of the society.

Allan F. O'Neill, Esq. has obtained £24 restitution money through the influence of Rev. Mr. Quin, R.C. Curate of St. John's, in this city.

Sixty electors registered for the town of Galway at the present Sessions, most of them freemen, on the Liberal interest.

Andrew Bourke, Esq. is recovering from the late atrocious assault on his person in Tipperary.

Mr. Blennerhassett, M. P. has expressed his decided approbation of the plan for a steam communication between Tralee and London, and his determination to render every assistance in his power to carry it out. He has also stated his determination to connect himself with the undertaking as a shareholder.

Mr. Pat. Lalor was chairman of the dinner to Mr. Fitzpatrick, M.P. at Maryborough, on Tuesday.

Sir Henry C. Carden, of Templemore, Bart. has bought from Mr. Bell, of Granard, the mare Ada, for £140.

The Custom House at Castlebar has been attacked several nights past, the windows and brasses of the locks broken by some unknown desperadoes.

A branch of the National Bank will be opened in Banagher next week.

A new pier is building at Monkstown, Cork, to which the Harbour Board have subscribed £50.

The Assistant Barrister of Cork, Mr. Martley, having decided that when waste places become occupied they are liable to the arrears of rates due on them, the Collectors have given notice to proceed for recovery of all arrears in that city.

Messrs. Kiernan are retained by the Conservative interest to attend the registry sessions throughout the county Tipperary, to facilitate the registration of electors at that side, and to resist the admission of fraudulent voters.

There was a violent thunder storm at Wexford, on Friday, when the flashes of lightning totally eclipsed the gas lamps, and the flood which rushed over the streets, to the depth of four feet, floated along boats from the river.

The situation of Manager to the Londonderry branch of the Provincial Bank continues vacant.

John Persse Grome, Esq. Thomas Hacket, Esq. and Henry French, Esq. of Geashell, have been appointed Magistrates for the King's County.

The Post-Master of Ballyglass, who is committed to Clonmel Gaol to stand his trial at the ensuing Assizes upon a charge of embezzlement and forgery, has hitherto borne an excellent character, and is possessed of landed property worth 100l. a-year in Mayo.

Fifty Conservatives and fifty-two Liberals registered at Clonmel county sessions before Mr. Howly. For the borough of Clonmel the registry was 46 Conservatives, and 103 Liberals.

Messrs. David Thornton and George Graham are appointed Valuers of Clonmel Union.

A Cavan correspondent communicates astounding news that papers connected with Ribbonism have been found in the new barracks at Cavan, and that some of the soldiers have been committed to prison. We (LIMERICK CHRONICLE) doubt the matter.

The Bishop of Down has arrived in Dublin. Kildare and Meath dioceses have not yet entered their protest against the Wheatley School of Divinity in Dublin.

The Lord Bishop of Down and Connor, confirmed 458 adults at Belfast this week, and 195 at Lisburn. St. George's Church, Dublin, debentures of £1,200 are ordered to be paid off.

Miss Hickman has given the cite for the new Church at Davenport, and 200l. towards its erection. The Molyneux Asylum Chapel, is to be enlarged, so as to accommodate 150 more than the present congregation.

The annual sermons in behalf of the Primitive Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society will be preached on Sunday, in the French Church, Cork, by Mr. Mervyn, and by Mr. Revington, of Dublin.

The Earl of Mountcashell has appointed the Rev. Wm. Dodsworth Bertie, M. A. of Pembroke College, Cambridge, one of his Lordship's domestic chaplains. At the October University entrance, Messrs. Wm. Battersby, Charles Black, and John Brinkley, of the Royal School, Enniskillen, obtained severally first, second, and third places, the number of candidates being eighty-four.

The orthodox Presbyterians in Dublin are about to take proceedings to recover the meeting-houses in Strand-street, and Eustace-street, and the large endowments connected with them, because the sentiments of the ministers who now officiate there, being Arian and Socinian, are directly opposite to those held by the founders and endowers of these meeting-houses. George Matthews, Esq. evinces a strong interest in the affair.

LIMERICK PROTESTANT ORPHAN SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of the Castle Connell Branch of this Society was held on Thursday, and was addressed by the Revs. Thomas Westropp, jun. John Elmes, Michael Lloyd Apjohn, and Godfrey Massy—the Earl of Clare presided.—On taking the chair, the noble Lord said, I carefully perused your Society's report for the past year, and was most happy to find, that you were more successful than your most sanguine friends could have anticipated. I regret that I have not yet been able to prevail on the wealthy absentee proprietors to contribute to your funds, but I do not despair. If I have not succeeded with the higher orders, I have with the humbler. On my return from the last meeting, I mentioned the subject to an old servant, who, having faithfully served me for 30 years, I may call my friend. Poor Woodyer died in March last, and bequeathed to your valuable institution £50. I have just proved his will, and the amount will be paid to your Treasurer in December. His Lordship's announcement greatly encouraged the friends of the institution, and produced a very favorable impression on the meeting, for the collection at the close amounted to £17, and exceeded that of the year preceding.

Meetings in favor of this benevolent institution, are to be held on Tuesday, the 22d inst., at Pallaskenny; on Wednesday, the 23d, at Askeaton, and on Thursday, the 24th, at Newcastle. The Revs. M. Lloyd Apjohn, James Hastings Allen, Joseph Gabbett, and Godfrey Massy, form the deputation; and, we trust, the friends of the orphan and widow will muster strong in every place, and by their generous contributions, enable the Committee to rescind the regulation at present in force, suspending the admission of new orphans, for want of adequate funds!

William Reardon was assaulted and robbed of 5s. on his return from Tipperary to Cullen, on Sunday, by two men, near Tipperary.

The Lords of the Treasury have sanctioned the loan of two sums—the one of 1,500l. for building a sessions house at Listowel, and the other of 900l. for making a new road from Killorglan to Caherciveen.

The Great Western will sail from Bristol this day for New York. The Liverpool will leave New York the same time, and her arrival may be looked for the 2nd of November.

The shops of New Ross were lighted with gas for the first time last Saturday by Mr. Colquhoun, who also lights the town of Wexford.

Yesterday, Capt. Nicholas Goss, of the schooner *Ashburton*, of Liverpool, lying at Waterford, fell overboard while executing some painting work at the vessel's side, and was unfortunately drowned.

Edmond Hanley, Esq. late of the Athlone branch, is appointed Manager of the National Bank at Waterford, in the room of Michael O'Brien, Esq. who resumes the management of the branch at New Ross.

At a Registry Club dinner in Wexford this week, Mr. Maher M.P. said—"Notwithstanding the smallness of the majorities on almost every question, he knew full well that Lord Melbourne would hold his place with the grasp of a drowning man!"
