

The Bishop of Cork cannot vote to the united Rectories of Athnowen and Kilnaglorry, now vacant, without the consent of the Privy Council. The gross value of the parishes is about £600 a-year. His Lordship has recommended to the Council, that the union should be continued. There is no fear but that in the disposing of this living his Lordship will promote one of the many deserving Curates in his diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Knox's Ecclesiastical Registry has been a great desideratum to the Clergy. The work would be much more complete if it gave the unions in the several dioceses.

The Rev. Michael Ryan, lately ordained, left Tuam on Thursday, for Australia, the scene of his future labours.

There was a charity sermon preached on Sunday last at the Chapel of Cooreclare, county of Clare, at which £77 was collected in aid of the funds for finishing this edifice.

Mr. Wm. Bennett Chester, son of the Rev. John Chester, of Ballyclough, obtained, at the recent entrance in College, ninth place and a Hebrew premium.

Thursday night, H. Owens, commissioner of rebellion, accompanied by thirty police from the Slane district, proceeded to Rousky, county Meath, to arrest the Rev. Mr. Lord, a clergyman of the established church, on a writ of rebellion, issued against him by the Rev. Skeffington Preston, for non-appearance in a title suit. The commissioner arrived at Mr. Lord's residence about day-break, and demanded a surrender. Mr. Lord alarmed at a siege so unseasonable, sounded a parley, and articles of capitulation being entered into, the forces were withdrawn, Mr. L. giving security for the payment of the demand.

Court Dalton, High Sheriff of Tipperary, and Richard Bourne, Esq. gave £5 each to repair the Roman Catholic Chapel of Nenagh.

The Earl of Listowell has arrived at Newmarket, descent of Richard Oliver Aldworth, Esq.

Mr. and Lady E. Pennefather have arrived at Mount Mannion, on a visit, from Darling Hill.

Three of the murderers of the late Andrew Bourke, are apprehended, and fully identified.

One hundred pounds reward is offered for apprehending the murderers of Thomas Haurahan, at Coole, Tipperary, a few nights since, and two hundred pounds for the murderers of Mathew Branagan, at Rathconell, Westmeath.

O'Connor Don, M.P. has become a member of Mr. O'Connell's Reform Registry Association for £5.

The Chairmanship of the Excise board is vacant by the death of Sir Francis Hastings Doyle.

It is thought a special commission will issue for the trial of the murderers of Police Serjeant Lawlor at Cork.

The order for a criminal information in the case of Stephen Wall, v. John Franks, for abusive language in the town of Roscrea, is discharged. The prosecutor a publican, who instigated the peasantry to resist the payment of tolls to Mr. Franks, the lessee.

There was an investigation at Trim court-house, on Saturday, into a charge preferred by the Rev. Mr. Mahan, P.P. against five policemen, for keeping company with women of bad character. Capt. Despard, stipendiary Magistrate, presided. The police were acquitted.

Boscha and Mrs. Bishop who deserted her husband from him, are at Copenhagen, where they have had a concert.

The late Michael Bodkin, of Nassau-street, Dublin, bequeathed £50 to the public charities, Dublin, and £20 to those of Galway.

The ceremonial of laying the first stone of the Workhouse for the relief of paupers under the Poor-law Act, took place on Monday at Grange, in the suburbs of Waterford, the site purchased for the building. Alderman Alcock, as Chairman of the Board of Guardians officiated. Considerable progress is already made in the operations preliminary to the proceeding of Monday. The boundaries of the main buildings and its various yards and appurtenances, are marked out.

At Burkstown special sessions, Wexford, last week, presentments were passed to compensate the proprietors of weirs on the Suir and Barrow, for injury done to their property by the cotmen, whose trespass and encroachment has now been viewed in a serious light, and by this mode must be effectually counteracted.

George Blackader, aged 16 years, son of the late John Blackader, of Cork, the only hope of his afflicted mother and a family of brothers and sisters, was drowned on the 7th inst.

Monday William Sutton, eleven years of age, son of Mr. William Sutton, of Waterford, was drowned at the hulk at the Custom-house-quay, while playing about a boat. Same evening, William Sangster, a Scotchman, mate of the *Shamrock* steamer, fell overboard while running out a plank for the passengers to walk ashore upon, and was drowned.

The income from taxation of St. Michael's Parish Commissioners, the last twelve months, was £3,853; expenditure, £3,699; balance in hands, £153.

At a general meeting of the Distillers of Ireland, held at Dublin last week—John Power, Esq. in the chair.—It was stated that from a return to parliament of spirits made in the United Kingdom during the year ended 5th January last, there was exported, from Scotland to England, 1,828,782 gals. Ditto Scotland to Ireland, 868,744 Ditto Ireland to England only, 325,347 And from Ireland to Scotland, Nil!

Further, that there has been paid to distillers in Scotland, during same period, in name of Malt Drawback, £219,000; while in Ireland there has been paid on the same account £4,900; from which it appears that the exportation of Spirits from Ireland has almost entirely ceased as to England, and has no entrance as to Scotland. The meeting were unanimously of opinion that this unfavourable state of their trade, felt seriously by all, and the continuance of the Malt Duty Drawback in Scotland, to so great extent, with all its accompanying abuses, make it imperative on them again to call for the interference of government. They resolved to forward an earnest memorial and recommendation to government, that this system, which the parliamentary committee thereon in the 1831, characterised "as affording great opportunities for frauds" should be now entirely abolished.
