EV. THEOBALD MATHEW.

The words of this imposing part of the service, were—"I promise you, that I will discountenance by all the means in my power, the causes of intemperance in drink. God enable you to keep the promise you have made to me."

It was utterly impossible to take the names of the multitudes which had assembled. The duty was abandoned on Monday morning, when 17,000 were present. Members were subsequently informed that their names to the Parish Priest, and medals and cards would be transmitted to each Pastor, for their use. No names were received from any person. Altogether the most singularly novel spectacle ever witnessed in Limerick. The great display of physical strength on one point in so incredibly short a time, serving of serious consideration for the influence exercised over so vast a number of men, known to them only by name, whose hand thousands were seen to rise simultaneously in the dust, rising to be believed, regenerated, and disengaged from the debasing vice of intoxication, far exceeded the expectations of hundreds of disappointed expectants who had gathered there, before his departure. They had spent the night from the country, many in despair, while more sanguine had taken the route to Cork.

On Sunday, Father Mathew introduced the late Lord Bishop of Cork, and the donation he had solicited for a poor school. Rev. Prelate gave him £5, saying that it is not in my power to make the protestants, but I have no doubt you will do your best to make them good Roman Catholics.
