Five capital arrests have been made by the police of
the Newport district, under the command of Sub-
Inspector Lewis, within the last week—four for murder
and one for cow stealing—all fully committed.

A fierce spring tide impelled by the boisterous gale
of yesterday, flooded all the low grounds in the vicinity
of this City, and the fields at either side of the Dublin
mail-coach road, at Groody Turnpike, at Cratloe,
Bunratty, and Ballinacurra are submerged. The
causeway from Quinpoole was quite invisible, having
been inundated six to 12 inches, and the fields for a
great extent at both sides of the road resembled an
angry river, where large boats could float with facility.
A deplorable catastrophe occurred there yesterday,
about ten o'clock in the morning, when Thomas and
John Danaher, of Parteen, brothers, Margaret
Lynch, and another female, (name unknown,)
were travelling on a horse and car to town.
They forded the road with some difficulty, but
had not proceeded half-way across, when the
horse startled by the spray of the tide, which was
blown against his face, suddenly turned aside, and fell
off the road into the deep water in the fields, where
the animal struggled to keep his feet, while the
Danahers and one of the women disappeared under
the car, and unable to extricate themselves, unfortu-
nately perished. The accident was observed from a
distance, and Michael Donnellan, of the New-road,
rode a horse up to the scene of danger, and at great
risk, while surrounded by a foaming tide, fortunately
released Margaret Lynch, who was clinging with a
desperate grasp to the horse's harness. With assis-
tance the poor animal was also rescued, but they had
to drag for more than an hour with boats before they
found the bodies of the two brothers, which were
taken to the Exchange, with the body of the third
victim, a woman unknown, when the Mayor held an
inquest, and under the melancholy circumstances,
the Jury returned a verdict of "Accidental Death."
At all seasons the causeway is a thoroughfare, but in
winter time no public road to this city can be more
dangerous, being then either mostly isolated or com-
pletely submerged by the floods. Hence several
accidents have occurred, and scarce a year passes
without loss of life, and no wonder, for there is no pro-
tection whatever to the passenger—no fence or guard
wall, not even a solitary stile, or upright object upon
the whole line to guide his steps. We hope this last
sacrifice of human life will, in justice and mercy,
secure the attention of the authorities.
