

Thursday night, the Coach Factory of Mr. Ryan, Ford-row, was entered by burglars, who scaled the wall with a ladder, and penetrated to the office by cutting the iron work of the door, but, after breaking in, were disappointed in the booty they expected. We are pleased to learn that the Bakers of this Kingdom are, probably, the first in the kingdom to abandon the old and desecrating custom of working on the Sabbath—a custom held up for the purpose of gratifying a few epicures, to the injury of many. We are glad to hear this comes spontaneously from themselves, before coercive measures would be taken under the Bakery Act. By the new arrangement they are to commence work until after 12 o'clock on Sunday. This moral change will enable the men to discharge their religious duties on the Sabbath, who, before, were locked up like prisoners in the bakers' shop. On Sunday, a quantity of hay and oats was maliciously consumed in the haggard of Edmund Waller, of Knocknairee wood, CloghJordan. D'Arcy, Clerk to the Armagh Poor Law Guardians, has obtained £50 damages at Down Assizes, against the *Newry Examiner*, for charging him with the rectory of Magourney, diocese of Cloyne, is vacant by the death of the Rev.
