

Hon. Baron Richards proceeded to the Court, and the following gentlemen were then sworn on the Grand Panel, for criminal business:—

The Jury having been sworn, Mr. Brewster, Q.C. addressed to his Lordship that he had received a communication from a highly respectable source, communicating that the barony of Kilenemana was misrepresented on the Grand Jury. It is true an application had been made to the High Sheriff on the subject, in answer, that gentleman mentioned Mr. Hammersly is representing that barony on the grand panel. He (Mr. Brewster) was prepared to prove, by affidavit, that Mr. Hammersly did not reside there. Baron Richards—The better way to dispose of the question is, to let it stand over until a particular day, and then let the High Sheriff come forward, prepared to meet the charge, and establish facts. His Lordship then charged the Jury:—Mr. Prittie, Gentlemen of the Grand Jury for the North Riding of Tipperary, I have not observed in the calendar which was laid before me, any particular case deserving of peculiar observation. The cases that come before you, I apprehend, are of a similar character to those that you are in the habit of disposing of. Should any difficulty occur, and that you wish to avail yourselves of my assistance, I will be most happy to afford it. I am not enabled to state whether you will have brought before you a greater or less quantity of criminal business than usual, but I regret to hear that the amount of business is not less. The calendar is not at all times to be looked upon as a faithful index of the state of crime. I shall, therefore, reserve my observations until I come to the examination of the cases; for when before me, I shall be better able to comment on them than now when I only see them on paper. Gentlemen, there is no reason, I am aware of, why the county Tipperary and the North Riding of this County should not have made the same progress in tranquility as other counties.—I discharged the gaol in the county Wexford; there were three sentences; and the calendar was light. I discharged the gaol of the county of the city of Waterford; I had sentence to pronounce only on a very few, and the bills of indictment were mostly for petty larceny. I have discharged the gaol of the county of the city of Kilkenny; though there were a great number of larceny cases, there was not any case of a violent or aggravated nature. Gentlemen, we must endeavour, as far as we can, in the discharge of our united duties, to suppress crime effectually. Crime which though it still continues to exist, does not exist to that considerable extent which heretofore characterized the district. We will do so in a temperate, and humane manner, but at the same time with a just discharge of our duty. In regard to the cases that will be brought before you, I need not inform the enlightened Jury which I now have the honour to address, that you will not send any person to trial without *prima facie* evidence, such as will be sufficient to satisfy at least twelve of your body. By *prima facie* evidence I mean such as would not be rebutted before a Judge and Jury, and when such cases come before you, you are imperatively bound to find a bill, and send the parties to trial, however painful it may be to your feelings. With regard to the fiscal business, I will not enter into it, if you wish to have the cases discussed; but I propose that you will bring forward the disputed cases before the criminal business,
