"LIMERICK CORPORATION ADDRESS TO PRINCE
ALBERT.—Our worthy and accomplished Chief Magis-
trate, and the gentlemen by whom he was accom-
panied, proceeded again in state on Monday, accord-
ing to a formal letter, received to that effect from
the Palace, and presented the Address of the Corpo-
ration to Prince Albert, at Buckingham Palace,
who received it most graciously, and by whom they
were presented with a gracious answer.—His Royal
Highness was dressed in a Field Marshal's uniform,
surrounded by the members of his household; and he
read the Address with a clear enunciation and a perfect
expression of the English language. On this gratify-
ing occasion several chiefs of the highland clans, in
their national costume, were present:—

"I thank you for this Address; I beg you to assure the Sheriffs
and Citizens of the ancient City of Limerick, that their cordial
congratulations on the happy occasion, have afforded me very
sincere pleasure."

"Afterwards the deputation returned to their hotel
in the same form. The Prince is really a handsome
fellow, most gentleman-like and dignified in both
appearance and manners. In the exercise of a sound
discretion I learn that a few days before, the Mayor

PROTESTANT ORPHAN SOCIETY.—The fourth general
meeting of the Tipperary County Protestant Orphan
Society took place at Clonmel Court-House, on
Thursday, when at least 700 of the nobility and gentry
assembled, the bench, jury-box, and galleries being
graced by a splendid assemblage of the fair sex.
Two-and-thirty Clergymen were present, and John
Bagwell, of Marlfield, Esq. presided. The report
states the Society to be in a flourishing condition, the
funds having increased by £200, the income of last
year being £1,202, and the expenditure £1,016.
The speakers were the Chairman, Rev. C. Mayne,
Col. Phipps, Rev. Mr. Lawrence, Rev. N. Herbert,
Rev. Mr. Atkinson, Rev. Mr. Rhoades, Rev. Mr. Arch-
dall, Rev. Mr. Dill, Rev. A. Bell, and Rev. John Elmes,
of this City, who said—"The first time he appeared
in public, was to support the Protestant Orphan cause.
It had been a portion of his duty recently to witness
a peculiar case, in which two orphans were mixed up
in Limerick. He referred to the case of the Hollands
which was tried at the late assizes, and it was with
pain he referred to it. It was a melancholy circum-
stance that a gentleman and lady of that name should
so far forget their charity as, with persevering cruelty,
to inflict sufferings on two creatures of tender years,
such as one could only expect to be inflicted by a
slave-driver—(Hear.) It was a case well known in
every corner of the kingdom, and it was important
that it should be known, for this reason—that it
showed that no one would be permitted to ill-treat
the Protestant orphans—(hear.)—no matter what
might be their rank or their wealth." (Cheers.)
There are 112 orphans in the establishment, to which
number twelve are to be added immediately.
