Defendant said he was drunk, and when he caught the policeman by the leg and pulled him down. Fined 10s. or a fortnight in prison. A young gentleman was brought up from the gaol, having been detained there some days on the application of members of his family, who are respectable, against him. After a caution from the Court, he was discharged, and having taken a fare-well to the gaoler, and several others whom he recognized, he left the Court.

Marine Coleman was charged with stealing potatoes from Mr. Michael M'Carthy, of the North Strand, and the possession of them. The defendant alleged that she was forced to take them, and the case was adjourned for the next court day, to give her an opportunity of proving her innocence. Laurence was ordered to find two securities of £5 each, to keep the peace to Hugh Massy, John Kelly, Thomas Tuohy, and Michael O'Brien, who were charged with having attempted to defraud Mr. James Barry in measuring stones, by conveying stones from his roads from some heaps which were intended to be measured to others, that they would be measured, so as to increase the amount for which they would receive payment. The evidence against the accused not being complete, the Court dismissed the case, but recommended Mr. James Barry's steward to dismiss the men. Informations were ordered against John Molony, for having rescued a constable from John Weldy, Mayor's constable, and Laurence O'Neill, for assault on a servant man John Potter's. John Donohue summoned William Burgess, Architect, for having kept his work which caused him to lose six weeks work as a constable.

Ordered to summon Mr. Burgess for amount of work lost, next Friday. John Heaffy and wife Michael Leonard. The complainant was the wife of Leonard, and summoned him for keeping articles of her's. She produced a long inventory containing all the minutiae connected with a lady's wardrobe, including side combs, oil bottles, stomachers, necklaces, negligees, bead chains, drops, &c. The Court dismissed. Informations were ordered against Francis, a bell hanger, for obtaining money by false pretences from Mr. James Barry, Solicitor. Defendant engaged with Mr. Barry seven months ago, to hang a set of bells in his house, for which he paid in advance, and also the price of the materials, but never came near him since.

James Smith, the *ci-devant* clerical student, was brought up under another charge. On Friday night he was confined, when on passing the cell where he was confined, he heard loud moans; having inquired what was the matter, Smith said that there was a man in the cell with him, and that he was in the agony, and if he was not removed somewhere immediately, he should lose his life. The turnkey opened the door, and found him dressed, but still moaning at a low rate, he entreated of the turnkey to remove Jack Molony's cell, as he was a stout hearted man and would keep him company. The turnkey was more compassionate than cautious, and consented and brought him to Molony's cell, on which Molony was also dressed and both the turnkeys endeavoured to tie him to the bed; he struggled violently, although his opponents were his fellows, and succeeded in getting outside the cell when he bawled for help. Mr. Worrall, the night turnkey, fortunately heard his cries, and got out of bed; came up to the prisoners, who were promptly secured, and conveyed to their cells, where they were left to the mercy of the ghosts for the remainder of the night. Informations were ordered against the turnkey for the offence.
