DEATH OF WM. CRAWFORD, Esq.-A correspondent writes, " I cannot describe the gloom which the announcement of the above calamitous event has cast over the City of Cork. Previous to his departure he complained of slight illness, which immediately on his arrival at Bristol eventuated in malignant fever, by which he was carried off in the prime of life. A void has been caused by his death which can never be filled up. Possessed of a Princely fortune, he merely viewed it as a trust for the poor, to whom he was a warm friend. Where is the charitable institution that ever made an appeal to his heart and noble disposition in vain? Where the desolate widow, whose prayer for relief, ever met with a refusal? Where the orphan, for whom he did not sweeten the cup of bitterness? His whole life was devoted to the amelioration of his species. In truth he was the pride of Cork, the prince of merchants, and the best of patriots. A vacancy will be caused in the representation of Cork City by Mr. Crawford's decease. Mr. Beamish, M.P., is the other partner in the great house of Beamish & Crawford, and necessarily will have to assist in the management of that extensive concern."
