THE LATE VISCOUNT GUILLAMORE.

The remains of this lamented Nobleman were in-
terred in the family vault, yesterday, at Knockany
Church, and notwithstanding it was announced to the
many who enquired, that the funeral would be pri-
vate, such was the desire to pay the last sad tribute of
esteem and regard to native worth and talent, that a
vast train of carriages appeared in the procession,
containing the relatives of the deceased, immediate
friends, and resident gentry of the neighbourhood,
besides a great number of gentlemen wearing crape.
There was a large concourse of mounted men, con-
sisting principally of the tenantry on his Lordship's
estates, with scarfs and hat bands, and some hundreds
of persons on foot, comprising mechanics, labourers,
&c. who also wore hat bands. There has seldom, if
ever, been produced, perhaps, anything that could be
put in competition with the grandeur of the sarso-
phagus, or the scientific and orderly manner in which
Mr. Ievers, of this City, supplied, conducted, and
regulated the extensive funeral procession on this
melancholy occasion. The cavalcade did not leave
Rockbarton until ten o'clock, and the distance to the
church was five miles, the entire route presenting a
mass of country people who lined the road, and ac-
companied the remains to the last resting place.

Attorney-General of Ireland, and a member of the
Privy Council, on the resignation of the Right Hon.
John Stewart, and in 1805 he succeeded the late
Right Hon. Lord Viscount Avonmore, as Chief Baron
of the Exchequer. Addresses in silver boxes were
presented to him by the Corporations of Dublin, Cork
and Limerick for his conduct as Attorney-General
during the State prosecutions.
