Maior Willington Capt Goslin Dr. Innes and the morning of the previous day. were to remain so, the tumult of the previous day having subsided into apparent quiet and repose. But another demonstration of popular force was made in Upper William-street, about 12 o'clock, when a fellow marched at the head of a mob, having a loaf of bread at the top of a pole, which he carried, The Mayor, who was on horseback from an early hour, instantly felt the danger of allowing this fellow to renew by such a signal the disturbance of Monday. He, accompanied by the Hon. J. P. Vereker, rode up at once to the crowd, and secured the fugleman of this division, whom he placed in custody, though at imminent risk to his own person. The rioters vociferated for their leader, and commenced an attack upon the Mayor and his small party, but the prisoner was held firm, though the Mayor in the struggle received various blows from stones. Sir William Macbean and Colonel Mansel rode up to his assistance with a reinforcement of military, and the leader of the mob was safely deposited in prison. The Mayor read the Riot Act in the midst of this commotion, and warned the crowds if they did not retire he would be obliged to order the troops to fire. This threat had the desired effect, and no further attempt was made to raise a disturbance. Occasional crowds collected opposite these provision shops and stores, which had been destined to plunder, but at three o'clock yesterday all further alarm for the public peace had ceased. At four, when the City had returned to its propriety, and the mob had seen the futility of any more attempts, the Mayor then conceived it his duty to hold a special meeting of his fellow-citizens for the humane purpose of alleviating the distress of the Teally destitute by a public subscription. The following hand-bill was issued for this purpose

"The Mayor carnestly requests a meeting of his fellow-citizens, at the City Court House, this day, at 4 o'clock, to take into consideration the distressed state of the labouring poor; and to adopt such measures as may be deemed most conducive to anneliorate their present condition.—Tholsel Court, Limerick, June 2."

Pursuant to the requisition of the Mayor, a meeting

of the citizens was held at four o'clock last evening, at the Tholsel Court, to raise subscriptions and adopt measures to relieve the distresses of the necessitous The meeting was attended by a great number of the influential citizens, among whom were Archdeacon Maunsell, Colonel Mansel, K. BANKING IN IRELAND .- A small work upon Banking in Ireland, written by Mr. Lewis Smyth, and pub-

lished in London, by Hooper, of Pall Mall, has just made its appearance. It is on sale by Messrs. Hodges and Smith, of Dublin. In this treatise, which cannot fail to interest his fellow-countrymen greatly, the author has collected a mass of documentary evidence to show the results of the Bank of Ireland monopoly. which he has further illustrated, by sketching the history of Banking in Ireland, which he divides into three periods. First, that which preceded the char-tering of the Bank of Ireland; secondly, that which followed the charter, and preceded the introduction of Joint Stock Ranks; and, thirdly, that which, embracing the rise of the Joint Stock Banks, brings the history of Banking in Ireland down to the present day. On these three periods, Mr. Lewis Smith has collected a variety of information/contained in no other publication with which we are acquainted. The Times newspaper took a favorable notice of the pamphlet, as soon as it appeared. We number a passage from the City article of the "leading fournal," to show the opinions entertained in that planter, of the publication. "In opposing the renewal of the Bank of Ireland charter; he has adopted an historical line of argument, and, by a detailed but surefuct narrative, shown that the existence of the bank in question has been the cause of successive evil to all but itself, for he does not deny that to the proprietors themselves the concern has been most prosperous. He takes a very sound view of the arguments that would prove from the prosperity of a privileged bank that the management is good, and justly asserts that the very act of raising a bank to a national institution, and endowing it with extraordinary privileges, shows a supposition that it will confer important benefits on the community, and that it violates its contract if it only enriches itself at the expense of the country at large. Hence no argument must be founded on dividend or bonuses, for it is very possible that a bank may be an excellent speculation for its proprietary, but a vile institution with respect to the public, who, as their representatives gave it distinctive privilege, have a right, as well as the shareholders, to call for an account of its stewardship. The prosperity of the Bank of Ireland, Mr. Smyth never for a moment doubts; on the contrary he estimates that out of a Capital of £1,000,000, it has since the date of its charter made the enormous sum of £19,000,000 and upwards; and the object of his history is to show that it has battened on the general misery, and that it has remained sole in its wealth, with poverty and wretchedness around it. * * * * His work will be useful, as giving in a form both clear and concise a history of the evils, consequent on a privileged and irresponsible body tampering with the currency. As the fate of the Bank of Ireland is necessarily linked with that of the Bank of England, in connexion with the inquiry now pending, these observations are all perfectly in point, and their appearance at this moment very opportune."
