

one minute of that protracted period. A correspondent's letter given below, deprives us of the pleasure of speaking more freely on this part of the subject. We heard with regret that in the melee with the rioters at William-street, on Tuesday, the Hon. J. P. Vereker, when assisting the Mayor to secure a ringleader of the mob, at a critical moment, was also struck, and received two blows from stones. The injury was not serious, it is gratifying to state, yet the attack upon so high minded a gentleman, and upright a Magistrate, was wholly unmerited. But at such a crisis the best hearted man in society, and he is certainly one of that honourable class, could not expect to escape an infuriate crowd. There is abundant cause however to be thankful to Providence for the saving influence of the Mathew principle. Had any of the populace indulged in the use of intoxicating liquors in the midst of their excesses, nothing under Heaven could have withstood their mad career, but the musket and sword. Then what a calamitous spectacle would have presented itself in the streets of Limerick! We did not observe a drunken person in the riotous crowds that traversed the city.

We have only one more circumstance to narrate in reference to the disturbances. The Mayor on Thursday night received private information that several hundred men would assemble next morning at Plassy, to impede the progress of the Shannon Navigation Commissioners. His Worship repaired to the scene, with a detachment of Lancers, and found 300 or 400 men there demanding work, but at not less than 1s. 6d. a day, which is above the regulated wages.—Informed that the Mayor was in the vicinity, they did not do any mischief, and returned towards town, when his Worship accosted them in Clare-street, in a tone of friendly remonstrance and admonition. He explained what was already done for their relief by public subscription, so as to furnish the market with potatoes, and distribute meal at a low price. The crowd proceeded to disperse, which they did in a few minutes, and nothing has since occurred in the slightest degree to alarm the peace of the city. Informations were yesterday taken by the Magistrates against the leaders implicated in the late disturbances, and who were identified by the Police.

The following have already given notice of applying for compensation to the Grand Jury for damage and loss of property by the rioters:—Sir David Roche, £29; Mr. Newsom, £38; Mr. Poole Gabbett, £18.—The committee for the management of the relief fund now being collected for the poor of the City, sent one ton of oatmeal to the Mendicity.

The potatoe market is this day (Saturday) most abundantly stocked with provisions from the country.

THE RIOTERS.—Informations were ordered by the Bench, against Ellen Houlahan, Catherine Houlahan, John Ryan, Michael Duffy, Richard Boland, John Hurley, and John Cooney, for plundering a flour and bread shop, belonging to Poole Gabbett, Esq. at Upper William-street, on Monday, and being of a riotous mob engaged in stone-throwing at the Police: against Michael Lynch, Jas. Gabbett, Margaret Houlahan, and Michael English, for being of a mob which attacked and plundered the premises of Mr. William Newsom, same day; against John Boland, and John Downes, for being concerned in a riot, in which the military were pelted with stones, on the same occasion. Bridget Cussen, Johanna Shaughnessy, James Hayes, and George Turner, arrested on suspicion of being implicated in the latter outrage, were discharged for want of evidence.

Mary Turner, Mary Collins, and Margaret Ward, were sentenced to a week's imprisonment, for absenting themselves from Mr. Chas. Walker's lace factory, being apprentices; and Bridget Bourke and Catherine Hayes, for same offence, were sentenced to 14 days' imprisonment, not having gone to work since they were liberated from prison, on conviction, for similar neglect. Three men summoned by Mr. James Blackwell, for nuisance on the public road, were fined 1s. each; Honor Kennedy, summoned by Edward Bourke, for unlawfully detaining a will of her husband's to which he was executor, and which he gave her for the purpose of copying, was ordered to remain in custody until she restored it.

Edward Hickey was fined 1l. or a month's imprisonment, for being drunk and attempting improper liberties with Margaret Pigott, a servant, while bleaching clothes in a field at the head of the Canal; John Carey, (his comrade) was fined a like sum for a similar offence on Bridget Flaherty.

Sir Augustus Warren is selling off £1300 a year of s property in Cork.

The 92d Depot embarked yesterday at Dublin for Glasgow, and the 91st Depot returns from Glasgow to Dublin.

Thursday, fifty men of the 48th, under Captain Mounstevan, marched into Cork from Millstreet, to join their Depot in that garrison. They are relieved by a detachment from the 74th Depot at Youghal.

The garrison of Cork patronised Miss Rosini Collins and Mr. Seymour at the theatre of that city, last night. The 65th Regt. under Lieut.-Colonel Senior, has arrived at Lapaire; and the 24th, under Lieut.-Col. Hughes, at Kingston. The 85th Regt. under Lt.-Col. Maunsell, was looked for daily at Montreal, from Upper Canada.

A troop of the Greys has replaced one of the 12th Lancers at Abergavenny.

Lieut. the Earl of Mulgrave, Fusileer Guards, son of the Marquis of Normanby, is appointed Aid-de-Camp to Lieut.-General Sir Richard D. Jackson, commanding the Forces in Canada.

Capt. Bouchier, is appointed Town Major at Kingston, and Lieut. Knight, Town Major at Quebec.

The Governor of Dominica has left the Army. Major Wright, R.E. succeeds Lt.-Col. Emmett, R.E. at Bermuda.

Lieut. Dalbair, 4th Light Dragoons, son of the Lt.-Gen. 3d Dragoon Guards, is appointed Adjutant at the Cavalry Depot, Maidstone, vice Cornet Shaw.

Major-General Napier inspected the 10th Regt. on Friday, 29th ult. at Burnley, which went through several of the prescribed movements with precision and accuracy, receiving the highest praise from the General, who inspected the barracks, hospital, books, &c. &c. at one o'clock. The detachments from Tadmorden, and Blackburn, left the parade in half an hour after, for their different posts. Major Broom is on six months' leave. Capt. Wilnot's company, stationed at Bury, and Capt. Franks' do. at Blackburn, marched on Tuesday morning to occupy the barracks at Bolton, held by the 86th.

Captain Gascoigne, of the India Company's Service, was taken up by the Police at Kensington, on Monday, in a state of insanity.

Brigadier Sale, of the 13th Light Infantry, who fell at the storming of Ghuznee, from a sabre cut in the face, owes his life to Brevet Major Kershaw, of that Regt. who covered his gallant commander, and pierced the assailant with his sword.

Major Deshon, 17th Regt. Cpts. Raitt and Gilland, 2d Regt., and Cpts. Darley and Robinson, 17th, have got Brevet Army rank, for their gallant conduct in the Afghanistan campaign.

The service companies of the 72d Regt. sailed from the Cape of Good Hope on the 16th of April, in the *Pestonjee Bomangee*, and *Lord Lynedoch*, for home.

Major Molesworth is appointed Barrack-master at Fort Beaufort, Cape of Good Hope.

The Barrack-masterships on the Western coast of Africa, and Sierra Leone, are open to candidates, also Maroon town and Falmouth, in Jamaica.

Laurence Peel, Esq. is appointed Advocate-General at Calcutta.

Lieut. Hills, R. N. Coast Guard, Lancing, for his machine for ascertaining the lee-way of a ship, has obtained the silver medal of the Society of arts, and Dr. O'Callaghan, 4th Dragoon Guards, for his apparatus for suspending injured limbs, the silver medal. The prizes were distributed by the Duke of Sussex on Monday.

John Langan, the ex-pugilist, was fined £2 by the sitting Magistrate in Liverpool, on Tuesday, for refusing proper accommodation to a sergeant and private of the 10th Regt. billeted on him. The Magistrate said that soldiers are entitled to prompt attendance and civility.

The estate of Tankardstown, in this County, was bought on Friday, in the Master's office, by George John O'Connell, Esq. for £5000.

Master Curry has appointed William Maziere, Esq. Gardiner's-place, Dublin, his Examiner in Chancery, and removed Mr. Forde, an officer of many years standing.

Mr. George Reade, son of the late Treasurer of Kilkenny, is elected to his father's place.

The sale under the Court of Chancery of the estates in Clannaurice and Iraghticonor baronies, Kerry, in the case of the Rev. Edward F. Conyers, v. Pierce Crosby and others, has brought £18,920, leaving a handsome surplus to Major Crosby. The purchasers were Dr. King, Messrs. W. Neligan, Wilson Gun, Rice, E. Stokes, and E. Murphy.

Dr. Warren has resigned the North Infirmary, Cork, and the election of a successor will be held on the 17th inst.

The case of the National Bank at Tuam against M. J. Blake, for the loss of a parcel of £700, is to be tried Dublin, and not at Galway.

The Lord Bishop of Clogher has presented his son, the Hon. and Rev. R. Tottenham, to the Incumbency of Aughaboy, in that diocese.

The Rev. Richard Dickson has come forward in the most liberal manner, and contributed over 100l. towards the relief of the poor on his property in the neighbourhood of Shanagolden. A good example has been set to the landlords of the Country to relieve the immediate wants of the starving poor on their properties, as the distress is beyond conception.

There was a very large and respectable field meeting of the Wesleyan Methodists at Adare demesne on Tuesday, when the members of the association were addressed by Messrs. Noble, Williams, and Tracy, Preachers in connexion. The religious service occupied several hours.

PROTESTANT ORPHAN SOCIETY.—The branch meetings of this most excellent popular institution commence next week. The opening one for the season will take place at Druff on Wednesday next, the 10th inst. Viscount Guiltinore is to preside, and a very efficient deputation will attend. The proceedings of this anniversary are expected to be peculiarly gratifying, and have been looked for with much anxiety by the respectable inhabitants of this very respectable district. On Thursday the 11th, the second meeting will be held at Kinnana, among that interesting portion of our people who have been not unaptly styled the *Vaudois* of Limerick. Nine orphans were admitted into the society on Wednesday last, of these six were from this city, two from Listowel, and one from Tarbert.

The Rev. Thomas Birney, late Rector of Aghavara, is promoted to the Incumbency of Templecain, worth £390 a-year.

The Rev. Hercules Langrishe, of Ballibay, declined the Rectory of Monaghan, with £400 a-year, offered him by the Lord Bishop of Clogher, and which Dean Roper's son accepted.

The Rev. Butler Brooke, late Incumbent of Aughaboy, brother of the member for Fenagh, is translated to the rectory of Aghavara, lately held by the Rev. Thomas Birney.

Lord Rossmore on his death-bed has subscribed £50 to the Cahans Presbyterian Meeting-house.

The Rev. Mr. Cussen, R. C. Clergyman at Askeaton, recovered and returned to Mr. Russell a gun which was taken out of his Mill some months since.

The Archbishop of York is father of the English bench of Bishops, having been consecrated Bishop of Carlisle in 1791, and translated to the see of York in 1807: his grace is consequently in the fiftieth year of his episcopate. This venerable prelate was born in the year 1757, and is now in the eighty-third year of his age. It is his grace's intention to hold an ordination at Bishopthorpe, the episcopal residence near York, in the course of three weeks. The Archbishop of Canterbury has crowned two sovereigns of England, and performed the marriage rite for one.

Lieutenant-General Lord Seaton has appointed the Rev. C. K. Williams, his Lordship's domestic chaplain, to be the master of the Grammar School at Plympton.

The Inspectorship of Monaghan gaol is vacant by the death of the Rev. Henry Eavitt, late Rector of Monaghan.

The Rev. Theobald Mathew is to preach at the chapel of Maryborough to-morrow, and administer the Temperance pledge on Monday.

The Rev. Mathew O'Brien, of Ennis, is elected a Fellow on the Wortley foundation at Cambridge. Thomas Caswell, B. A. is elected a Junior Fellow of Clare Hall, same university.

The Rev. Theobald Mathew preached at Rathcormac Chapel on Sunday, and subsequently administered the pledge of Temperance to postulants.

REV. T. MATHEW IN TRALEE.

Tuesday evening, Mr. Mathew arrived in Tralee, from Cork, en route to Listowel, where he had been invited by the Rev. Mr. Mahony, the Parish Priest of that town. The rumour of the Rev. Gentleman's arrival having transpired, a large concourse of people assembled in front of Moore's Hotel in Castle-street. The first thing which struck attention was the manner in which Mr. Mathew met a woman who flung herself on her knees before him in the hall. He told her that she ought to be ashamed; that he was tired of telling people that he could do nothing for them, that she should look to God; that he was willing to administer the pledge, but it was the spirit of the Almighty alone which could enable any one to keep it.

Mr. Mathew came forward on the steps of the hotel at about seven o'clock, and addressed the multitude, who at that period were flocking in from the country round. The society of which he had the honour to be President was in a flourishing condition. It overspread the entire land. There are now on their books a million and a half. They were all aware for what they came before him. They were laying the foundation of their temporal happiness, and he hoped, with God's blessing of their eternal. They would he prayed walk in the footsteps of their Divine Saviour, obedient to his commandments, in the practice and pursuit of every Christian virtue. That was the way to bring credit upon their Society—that was the way to carry out its objects.

Mr. Mathew then proceeded to administer the pledge, repeating it in a loud and distinct tone, while the kneeling postulants responded. The first batch, consisting of seventy persons, having been disposed of a second eagerly made their way through the gate, the members of the Tralee branch of the Society, some of whom carried temperance banners keeping order in the absence of the police force, who had been ordered to Listowel in the morning, in anticipation of a great temperance demonstration there. This batch consisted of at least one hundred and fifty. In addressing the third batch, consisting of about two hundred, he took occasion to say, in course of his exhortation, that one distinguishing feature of the society was that it included persons of every creed and shade of politics without distinction. Teetotalism was a neutral ground, one of these green spots in the desert of life, where all might meet in peace and harmony. If they continued this course, they would find their comforts multiplied from the hand of that God who had blessed the widow's cruise of oil.

The numbers who took the pledge were between six and seven thousand, a large portion of whom were women, a considerable number of children following their example. These, as they came before him, the Rev. Gentleman continued to exhort, illustrating his precepts which Scriptural allusions and apposite anecdotes.

Mr. Mathew was also busily occupied next morning, having administered the pledge from half-past six till nine, to about two thousand persons; after which, he proceeded to Listowel.

"Stoney Pockets" whom the Dublin papers reported dead in a hall of that city, is now walking the streets of Limerick—a Resurrectionist!
