Public Meeting and Address.
THE PARISHIONERS OF QUIN, and surrounding district, in the County of Clare, anxious to testify their regard to JOHN SINGLETON, Esq. of QUINNVILLE ABBEY, on his return from the Continent, after an absence of nearly two Years, held a Meeting in the PARISH CHAPEL, on SATURDAY, the 13th Instant, when the Rev. DANIEL CORBETT, P. being voted to the Chair, it was unanimously agreed upon, that Mr. SINGLETON should be received with every demonstration of respect that lay in their power. Accordingly, bonfires were lighted on the surrounding hills—the Village of Quin was neatly illuminated, and a body of nearly one thousand men went in procession a distance of five miles to meet him. They also presented him, on the day after his return, with the following Address:—
ADDRESS
To JOHN SINGLETON, Esq. Quinnville Abbey, SIR,
We, the Inhabitants of the Union of Quin, gladly avail ourselves of this early opportunity (on your return, after an absence of nearly two years from your native country) to tender to you the sincere expression of the most cordial welcome, and the unfeigned assurances of our heartfelt delight, at seeing you return in health and spirits to the bosom of your amiable family.
It is with feelings of no ordinary pleasure we greet your arrival, as the source of renewed happiness to this part of the Country, where we have experienced at your hands those good results, which must ever flow from active benevolence, and the most enlarged views of philanthropy and public virtue.
We greet you, Sir, as the poor man's Magistrate; the considerate and good landlord; the enlightened country gentleman; the good neighbour; the munificent donor to our Chapel; the benevolent friend to the poor; the liberal Protestant, whose mind is unimpaired by sectarian prejudices, inimical to the general interests of the country.
On these grounds, Sir, we would be ungrateful indeed if we did not receive you with those demonstrations of respect and attachment which are so justly your due; and we beg to assure you that this address is but a feeble expression of the sentiments of gratitude and esteem we entertain personally towards you.—Wishing you long life, health and happiness, we have the honour to remain your devoted and ever grateful neighbours and friends.

REPLY
To the Rev. DANIEL CORBETT, and Parishioners generally, of the Union of Quin.
GENTLEMEN,
I have to acknowledge, with the deepest feelings of gratitude, and highest sense of its value, the Address, as unexpected as it was undeserved, of congratulation on my return from the Continent, which your partiality and over estimate of my merit on my part, or of services rendered to my neighbours generally, in the discharge of my magisterial duties, induced you to adopt, at a Meeting held in Quin, yesterday, for that purpose; the unanimity of which, as conveyed to me in the communication of your valued Minister, and worthy Chairman, confirmed by the enthusiastic reception I experienced at your hands, at the late hour of my arrival last night, leave no doubt upon my mind (and none could, for a moment, have a place there, were it not for the conviction of my own inadequacy of merit, as compared with your too flattering expressions in my behalf) of all being effusions genuine and spontaneous, emanating from the honest hearts of a generous and grateful people. Assuch, my friends, do I receive your Address, which I shall treasure up with gratitude and pride, and for which I return you my thanks, not in the finished and polished phraseology usual upon such occasions (and which I might succeed better in imitating, were my feelings and my heart less touched by such manifestations of regard as are this day so generally poured upon me); but with a feeling corresponding to your own, of heartfelt thankfulness to the Almighty Dispenser of human events, by whose permission of return to my native land I am enabled to behold the happy faces that now assemble to greet and welcome my return amongst them.
I feel a regret at having remained so long absent from such a people, and now think that even renewed health, with the pleasure and instruction derivable from foreign travel amid some of nature's sublimest scenery, the triumphs of the arts, and the ancient glories of other days, are almost too dearly bought by an absence from a warm-hearted people, capable of appreciating merely good intentions in their behalf, in such a manner as you have done.
Mrs. SINGLETON and each of my family, in thanking you for your allusion to them, beg to unite with me the sincere expression of their regards for you collectively and individually, with our united prayer for your welfare and prosperity, and believe me, Rev. and dear Sir, and Parishioners generally of this Union to remain ever
