### A PROCLAMATION.

EBRINGTON, IT having been represented to the LORD LIEUTENANT, that Processions of TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES have, in some instances, borne an appearance hurtful to the feeling of a portion of their fellow-subjects, as seeming to partake of the nature of Party Display, his Excellency feels bound, especially after his proclamation respecting other processions, to give a caution to the members of these Societies. To the benefit which the Temperance pledge has conferred upon Ireland, in the improved habits of the people, and the diminution of outrage, his Excellency bears a willing and grateful testimony; but it is not the less his duty to impress upon all persons who have associated themselves under that pledge, that their processions become amenable to the law equally with those of any other societies, if they exhibit any party emblems, or are accompanied by music playing party tunes. He trusts, therefore, that all friends of sobriety and good order will be particularly studious to avoid any demonstrations which can possibly be construed into party exhibitions, or give reasonable cause of offence or alarm to any of their countrymen. ### TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

AT a General Meeting of the United Committees of the TEMPERANCE SOCIETY of St. Michael's, St. Mary's and St. John's, on THURSDAY, July 9, 1840, MR. JOHN HANDS in the Chair; MR. DANIEL M'NAMARA, Secretary, the following Resolutions and Address were agreed to:— Proposed by Mr. James Ryan, seconded by Mr. William O'Neill, RESOLVED—That having seen a Proclamation from Lord Ebrington, Chief Governor of Ireland, prohibiting Temperance Processions, while we bow with submission to the Executive mandate, we deny on our part any infringement of the Law, either as having taken place, or been intended, by the different Temperance Societies in our localities. Proposed by Mr. Thomas Shield, seconded by Mr. John Morony, RESOLVED—That we present an Address to his Excellency, conveying to the Irish Government a review of the general principles of our Body, together with an exposition of the original regulations and basis on which was raised the superstructure of our Society, and which guided our proceedings. Proposed by Mr. George Myles, seconded by Mr. Richard Corbett, RESOLVED—That attachment to the Throne, a love of peace and order, the care of our families, and the general improvement of our social, moral, and religious conditions, were the objects we had in view in becoming members of the Society of the VERY REV. THEOBALD MATHEW, and that we were actuated by no political or party motives. Proposed by Mr. Patt Spillane, seconded by Mr. Charles Cooper, RESOLVED—That we are at a loss to conceive what is meant by the exhibition of party banners, or the playing of party tunes, as no colour has been ever worn by our Societies, nor tunes played by our band, except the usual national ones.

### ADDRESS TO THE LORD VISCOUNT EBRINGTON, Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland.

We, the Committees of the Parochial Temperance Societies of the City of Limerick, in public meeting assembled, beg leave most respectfully to approach your Excellency, in consequence of a Proclamation issued by your Excellency's command, with regard to Temperance Processions, &c. &c. We beg to assure your Excellency that we bow without a murmur to the Majesty of the law, although unconscious of having offended its mandates in the slightest particular. That willing submission to the executive order of a protective and popular Government becomes the performance of an agreeable duty, when we consider the mild nature of the Caution conveyed to us; and the pure spirit of impartial justice in which it was conceived.—At the same time, we beg most respectfully, but firmly to deny the justice of the report on which your Excellency's Proclamation was founded, viz.:—"That in some instances party colours or banners were displayed, and that party tunes were played in our processions." In the assemblage of large numbers of the members of Temperance Societies, and in the amusements which have supplied the place of intoxicating and ruinous drinks, the greatest care has been taken that no party emblems should be displayed, even by accident, or party tunes played by the temperance bands, unless green the national colour and popular national airs of old Ireland be considered to partake, even by implication, of such a character. One of the most prominent and imperative rules of our Society is, the absence of all political or party feeling or proceeding, our grand guiding rule and principle being brotherly affection, in the most extensive sense of the word, the love of God, to honor and obey her Majesty the Queen, and the Government of the Country, and do unto others, as we would be done by.

We hope your Excellency will pardon us for saying that we admit no comparison with another public body, against whose annual processions and displays your Excellency has been pleased to issue a prohibitory proclamation; as the difference between devoted loyalty and the existence of peace and improved habits, consequent upon the practice of sobriety—and the reprehensible and violent conduct, and outbreaks of the body to which your Excellency alludes, must be too obvious.

We should be glad to learn from your Excellency whether the Proclamation goes so far as to prevent all Processions and Musical Entertainments, with or without Banners, or whether "Patrick's Day, Garry-owen, the Land of the West, and Rory O'Moore," are included in the category of Party Tunes, &c. &c.
