The Derry Castle estate, County of Tipperary, was set up to auction on Thursday, by the celebrated George Robins, at 50,000 guineas, when the bidding went up rapidly to 69,000, which, not being considered the full value of this splendid property, it was bought in at 70,000 guineas.

The sittings of the Wesleyan Methodist Conference at Newcastle, closed on Friday. A long discussion took place relative to the Wesleyan Methodists in Canada, which terminated in the Conference deciding that their brethren in Canada shall exist as a distinct body, independent of the British conference.

Dr. Wiseman has left Rome for England, having been consecrated for the Midland district; and Rev. Mr. Logan is to be Vice President of the College at Oscott. Dr. Weedale is summoned to Rome, to be consecrated for the Northern district.

Miss Easbery has given the Rev. A. Thomas, of Dublin, £125, for the Jews' Conversion Society. The late Bishop of Chichester was tutor to Sir Samuel Romilly's family.

Edward Norman, A.M. for the diocese of Meath, and William Gray, A.B. for Droimore, received Deacons orders from the Bishop of Lichfield on Sunday. The funds of the Down and Connor Education Society for the year ending 1st July last, amounted to £674.

This day, the head-quarter division of the 97th, with Band and Staff, under Lieut.-Colonel Campbell, arrived at the New Barracks, from Athlone. The entire Corps (with the exception of one company, which will arrive here on Wednesday) are now concentrated in this garrison. Colonel Campbell is 34 years in the service.

Major L'Estrange, 36th Regiment, has obtained leave to the 10th October. Capt. De Lacy commands the Depot at Clare Castle, during his absence. This day, Major Creagh, from leave, took the command of the 81st Depot, at Fermoy.

Sir Edward Blakeney yesterday inspected the 20th Regt. under Col. Thomas, M.P. at the Phoenix park. Wednesday morning Capt. Smith, Ensign Minchin, and 60 rank and file of the Depot 48th, left Youghal for Spike Island, to embark at Cove in the Vesuvius steamer, to join the service companies at Gibraltar.

The Depot of the 69th are again fixed in their late quarters, at Nenagh Barracks. The 45th and 98th Regiments will be added to the Irish establishment next month.

The 42d, or Royal Highlanders, at Templemore, having this week received the route for Fermoy, two companies, under Major Macdougall, marched yesterday; two companies (head-quarters) under Colonel Johnston, this day; two companies, viz. the detachments from Roscrea and Nenagh, under Captain Dunsmore, on Monday next.

A company of the 59th replace the 42d at Tipperary, and either a company of the 27th or 59th, replace the party of the 42d at Cappawhitte. On the embarkation of the 38th the 42d will move from Fermoy to Cork. Lieut. Evans is appointed Paymaster to the 38th Depot. The Depot has arrived at Ballincollig, from Cork.

Capt. Clune accompanies the draft of the 5th from Castlebar to Cork. Brevet Lieut.-Col. Manners, 37th, is ordered to proceed from Birr to Cork, to embark to join the service companies in Nova Scotia, and Major Bradshaw joins from leave to command the Depot.

Officers under orders to join the Service Companies of the 74th regiment, and to accompany a draft of 150 rank and file, and two sergeants, viz.—Captains Alves and Eyre; Lieut. Fordyce; Ensigns De Butts, Duff, and Wallnut. The 74th Depot has been ordered from Fermoy to Waterford, and marched this morning, leaving in Fermoy, the draft of 150 rank and file, under command of Captain de Saumarez, until the arrival of Captain Alves, who is in England on leave, but ordered to return to take charge of the draft.
