the regularity, order, and system pursued. There is one field on this farm, now entirely in turnips, containing governy five Irish acres. This field was broken, got three ploughings, a ross harrowing, was drilled, sown with turnips, and rolled, in four days, last season. The distance walked in effecting this, was over 1,000 miles, each drill and a-half measuring an Irish mile. Mr. Christy is certainly a model for those who still pursue the old system of farming.
