Lieut. Harvey Tuckett, late 11th Hussars, was on Wednesday brought up at Wandsworth, before the magistrates, for shooting at the Earl of Cardigan, with intent to kill, in the late duel at Wimbledon.

Notice was given on Monday to the Chelsea Pensioners at Woolwich, that they must attend on 15th next month, when such men as are found able to do duty will be embodied for home service in her Majesty's garrisons and forts.

Dr. Johnston, 48th, is under orders to proceed to join the service companies at Gibraltar. His removal from the Depot at Youghal is very much regretted, being deservedly much liked by all, for his extreme kindness to the sick, and benevolence to the poor.

The last division of the 86th Regt. under Major Bouverie, left Belfast on Thursday, per the Alban steamer, to join head-quarters in Dublin, under Lieut.-Colonel Creagh.

Colour Sergeant James Rankin, 42d, prosecuted two women on Wednesday, in Cork, for receiving soldiers' necessaries. They were convicted and fined in the sum of 5l. each, with treble the amount of the property, and in default of payment to be imprisoned three months.

Capt. Roper, 8th, or King's Regt. has left Clones to embark in the Britannia steamer for Halifax, Nova Scotia, to join head-quarters.

Captain Richard Anthony Reynolds, 11th Hussars, is dismissed the service, but strongly recommended to her Majesty's gracious consideration. Lieut.-Colonel Lord Cardigan has not escaped the animadversions of the Court-Martial.

The 20th Regt., Col. Thomas, M. P., was inspected on the 10th inst., at Dublin, when the Lieut.-General Commanding expressed his high opinion of their soldier-like appearance, the care and exactness of their manoeuvring, the neatness of their appointments, the cleanliness and general air of comfort in their barrack-rooms and hospital, &c.

Thomas C. Pensonby, Esq. Lieutenant Royal Navy, late of Croto House, Kerry, is appointed to the command of the Lucifer steam frigate, on the Irish station.

The Royal Marines have orders to send out more recruiting parties. The Marine establishment must be augmented, as the Line are now doing dock-yard duty, which is peculiar to the above force.

The Army pensioners in Cork are this quarter made liable for the support of their wives and children, who may be in the work-house, under the 56th section of the Poor Law Act.

The Concert at the Northumberland Rooms on Thursday evening was most fabulously attended, and afforded the lovers of music an exquisite treat.

The surprising abilities of Miss Rossini Collins, as performer on the violin, must be witnessed to be appreciated; she is unquestionably the first living representative of that late monarch of the bow, Paganini.

The vocal powers of Miss Victoria Collins, an infant prodigy, are of a very high order; she sings with much taste and strength of voice, which promises well for future excellence. The Bohemian melody, by the three young ladies, with Flute obligato by Mr. Collins, was enthusiastically encored.

The performance of Master Sullivan, on the Piano Forte, (a pupil of Mr. Clarke) was not inferior to that of many others. He executed some very difficult passages with an exquisite delicacy of touch, yet a firmness of nerve, that reflect much credit on his instructor.

Mr. Thompson Russell said, the lane was his father's property; there was some time ago a gate to it, but it was taken down, and the lane thrown open.

Mr. Blackwell, Conservator, proved that it was always considered a public lane, which the contractor had a right to sweep. The Bench ruled accordingly.

John Commins was charged with assault and ill-treatment of Johannah Geary, a servant. The complaint was clearly disproved by Mr. Commins, and the Magistrates dismissed the case.

George Brewder, corn-broker, was fined one pound or a month's imprisonment for an assault on a little boy at the Black-boy-Turnpike. Margaret Collins was fined 5s. for assault on Mary Finucane.

Joshua Pigott was fined 10s. for assault on Laurence Smith. The Defendant, who is master of the Magnet, went on board his vessel on Monday evening, when he found Smith and another boy fighting, when he 'ropended' them both for it.

The Magistrates said that however such conduct may be excusable if the vessel was at sea, it was decidedly unjustifiable while in the harbour, where the Master could have summoned them before the Magistrates for misconduct.

Some other cases which lay over were then disposed of, and the Court adjourned.

A General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is sitting in Rosemary-street Church, Dublin, for the purpose of obtaining modifications of the rules proposed by government respecting the distribution of the Regium Donum.

The new Chapel of Kiltrush is now being slated and when it is covered in, which is expected to be in November, will be consecrated by the Roman Catholic Bishop of the Diocese. The Rev. Mr. Mathew has kindly promised to preach the consecration sermon, and on this occasion will administer the pledge in Kiltrush, where he is most anxiously expected, as it is his first visit to that extensive and populous district. The Parish Priest, the Rev.
