vitally affecting your interests should be exempt from the wholesome controul of publicity? Are you willing to yield with submission to an authority which in this respect is superior not only to our Courts of Justice, but to the Imperial Senate of the Empire? On your reply depends my tenure of that trust which unsolicited you were pleased to impose, and which for your sakes attached to a Body which would hide from public view the acts of its individual members :-- where a desire for concealment exists there are just grounds for suspicion. I do not apply those observations to any member of the present Board. To those who disagree with me in opinion, I willingly concede what I claim for myself— purity of intention. But the precedent of secrecy is one of danger, and should be particularly guarded against when pecuniary interests of paramount importance are involved. These are no groundless apprehensions. We have only to review the former working of this system in England, to be satisfied of the facilities which are unhappily open to Poor Law mismanagement.

But where you may ask lies a remedy for those more than anticipated grievances? It is as simple as it must be effectual. On the 24th instant a meeting of our Board will be held to discuss this very serious question. If in the meantime you meet and firmly express your wishes, either by petition or remonstrance, they cannot remain unheeded. The Commissioners may consider themselves as servants of the Crown, but the Guardians are those of the People, and consequently, cannot honorably or honestly seek exemption from the acknowledged right of a master—obedience to a reasonable command.

On this your future security will depend, and should your request be distegarded, (which I cannot consider possible) you will then be prepared to elect in my lace, a more pliant instrument of injustice, as I am determined not to give even the sanction of my presence to a principle which I am convinced is detrimental to the best interests of society.
