

inspected the Depot... Sunday evening. Mr. Fitzgerald stated that they were Captains of ships, by whom he was employed as Ship-broker; that some of them lodged in his house, and the rest were friends of theirs, who sat with them, and whom he could not turn out at a particular hour. The Bench dismissed the case. Thomas Hughes was next summoned for having persons in his house on Sunday night after nine o'clock. There being no circumstances in extenuation in this case, the defendant was fined ten shillings.

The Excise appeared to prosecute several grocers for selling tea illegally. The cases named for this day were against Edward Synan, Edward Sheehy, Joseph J. Bromwell, and Michael O'Mealy. Mr. Worrall on the part of the defendants applied for a postponement until next Friday, on the grounds that the law was not well ascertained on the subject, and that the grocers of Dublin had forwarded a memorial through the Lord Lieutenant to the Lords of the Treasury, and that all convictions under that Act in Dublin had been suspended until the final decision of their Lordships. should be made known. He felt warranted in stating that his Excellency considered their case a very important one, and he might say a very great grievance, and under those circumstances, as it was likely something final would shortly be done, he hoped the Bench would adjourn the case for a week. Mr. Eman said there would be thirteen cases before the Court on next Friday, so that it would expedite the business to hear these cases now. The Bench ruled that all the Excise cases should stand over until next Court day. Several cases of nuisance and trespass were then disposed of, after which the Court adjourned.

We understand that an intended meeting is announced at Kilrush, next Sunday, for the delusion, called "Repeal," which Mr. O'Connell and his misguided followers, are agitating with such mischievous fervour. Mr. Steele is mentioned as intending to take a part on this occasion, and we cannot forbear from giving expression to our regret, that he should persevere in the support of an effort so preposterous. The Hon. John Massy, and family, have returned to their residence Tontine Buildings, from Kingstown. Sir Philip Crampton is gone express from Dublin to Mulgrave Castle, Yorkshire, to attend Lord Normanby, who it is feared must lose his hand. Lord Morpeth, in concluding his reply to the address to him at Killarney, presented by the High Sheriff and deputation, says, "Cultivate, gentlemen, and closely cherish those fruits of industry, order, temperance, charity, and piety, which are yet more bright and lovely than all the varieties of the earth's surface around us, or of the hues with which they are now glowing, since, unlike them, they are heavenly and they are undying."

The Act 3d and 4th Victoria, chap. 105, for abolishing arrest on mesne process in civil actions, which comes into operation to-morrow, also extends the remedies of creditors against the property of debtors. On the recommendation of Maurice O'Connell, Esq. M.P. the Postmastership of Tralee is conferred on Mr. Thomas O'Reilly, void by the resignation of Mr. Busted. Wednesday, while the Repealers of Tramore were setting out to attend the Repeal meeting in Waterford, the Police interfered to take away some of the banners, on which were inscriptions of a political nature, and therefore considered of an illegal character. Strong opposition was manifested, and the Repealers remained in possession of the banners.

At the Waterford Repeal dinner, Mr. O'Connell returned thanks for the toast of the Lord Bishop of Cashel's health. In doing so, he ventured to relate a conversation between himself and the venerable Prelate, relative to the Knight of Kerry, the question of Reform, Judge Perrin and the Bench of Bishops, which, we believe, to be at the least very apocryphal. Mr. O'Connell has signified his intention of sending Sir Benjamin Morris, the Repeal chairman at Waterford, to Parliament the first convenient vacancy. The Munster provincial Repeal meeting is to be held at Cork early next month. Captain James Power, of Ballydine, a Deputy Lieutenant, presided at a Repeal dinner to Mr. O'Connell, on Thursday, at Carrick-on-Suir.

A special memorandum is made at Dublin Castle of the name of every Magistrate or professional man, attending the present Repeal meetings. The Mayor of Waterford has called a meeting to provide a market square in that city. The leases of the ironmongers estate upon the Bann in Derry, expired with the Bishop of Meath. Todd and Co., Mary-street, have disproved the charge of the Corn Exchange Repealers, that the Scotch Commercial Houses in Dublin engage no Irishmen. The above firm employs 52 Irishmen in their concern. The commercial house of Harvies, Wellington-quay, which employs 58 Irishmen, has also indignantly refuted the calumnious assertion. An acre of potatoes sown by Capt. Jacob, of Mobar-nan, Tipperary, has produced 280 bris.

The great Wizard of the North has opened in Cork his cabinet of necromancy. The Board of Commissioners advised the Tralee Guardians to appoint additional stations in the Union for vaccination, but the latter allege they have not sufficient medical men! At Tralee Quarter Sessions, Michael O'Sullivan, Thomas O'Connell, and John Howran, sheep-stealers, were sentenced to ten years' transportation. On the morning of the 6th inst. the concerns of Messrs. Joseph, tobacco merchants; D. Fraser, fish and oil merchant; Mosson, dry-good merchant; Miller's hotel, and C. Williams, sail-maker, all at Quebec, were destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at £30,000.

Thomas Steele, Esq. is appointed permanent President of the Trades of this city. At the Weekly Market, yesterday, Beef averaged 44s. per cwt. sinking offal. Sales—Sir D. It is hoped that the liberality of a charitable Public will be exercised to alleviate the distress of those truly pitiable creatures, the funds of the Institution being scarcely adequate to procure food for 570 inmates, much less to clothe them. The Treasurer is in advance £364; and as this will be the last Winter that an appeal is made on behalf of this Charity, previous to the Poor Law Act coming into operation, it is confidently expected that this application will be attended with success.
