BRUTAL ASSAULT AND MURDER.

Yesterday the Mayor held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital, on view of the body of Bridget Fahy, who came by her death under the following circumstances, as appeared from the evidence of two witnesses who were examined, and the declaration of the deceased previous to her death, taken by Mr. Williams, Sub-Inspector. On Sunday evening, the 4th of October, Mary Gilburne was beating a person named Mary Welsh, in John's Square, and the deceased asked her why she did so. Anne Gilburne, the daughter, came over from the corner of the Square, and attacked her violently with both hands, pulled a quantity of her hair out of her head, and gave her several blows, aided and assisted by her mother. Bridget Fahy went next day to serve a summons on Mary Gilburne, for the assault on the previous night, when Anne Gilburne took a tin-can full of water and threw it in her face; she then took a stick from behind her back, and struck her on the side of the head. The deceased walked across the street to the gate of the brewery, and fell there bleeding and senseless. She was brought into Hospital three days after the outrage, and died yesterday morning. Dr. Thomas Kane deposed, that when she was brought to the Hospital she was labouring under a wound of the left side of the head, which was laid bare to the bone; the wound seemed of a very sloughing character, accompanied with high fever. She recovered in some degree while under treatment, but soon after alarming symptoms set in, and continued until that morning, when she died; considers her death was the consequence of that wound.

The jury returned the following verdict:—"We find that the deceased Bridget Fahy, came by her death in consequence of a wound on the left side of the head, given her by Anne Gilburn, in the rere of the Square, on the 5th day of October last."

The Prisoner was then fully committed to take her trial at the next Assizes. The deceased was the wife of a labourer, mother of six children, and bore an excellent character for industry and good behaviour.
