

George Green, Patrick Mayer, Edw. Mulcahy, Pierce Russell, Thomas Rowe, John Shea.
Lieut.-General Sir George P. Adams, who has got the Colonelcy of the Inniskilling Dragoons, entered the Army in 1795, as Cornet in the Queen's Bays, and graduated in that Regiment to the rank of Major. His service was in India.
Capt. Kidd's company, 22d, from head-quarters, Athlone, expect to relieve Capt. Campbell's company, on detachment at Portumna, next month.
This day is the anniversary of the battle of Nivelle, in which the 2d, 3d, 5th, 6th, 11th, 23d, 24th, 27th, 28th, 31st, 32d, 34th, 36th, 39th, 40th, 42d, 43d, 45th, 48th, 51st, 52d, 53d, 57th, 58th, 60th, 61st, 66th, 68th, 74th, 79th, 82d, 83d, 87th, 88th, and 91st Regiments defeated the French Army.
This day three recruits were raised in garrison for the 49th, and one for the 18th.
The *inconstant* frigate is at Cove. Lieut. Sankey has left for Clonmel on leave.
The service companies 81st, at Barbadoes, proceed this month to Demerara and Berbice, to relieve the 70th Regt. The 81st are finally destined for Bermuda.
Two troops of cavalry are to be sent to Fermoy.
Two Majors of Hussars have died within a week of each other. We announced the death of Major Jenkins, 11th, at Brighton, and have now to add that of Major Biggs, 7th Hussars, at Doncaster. Major Biggs purchased every step of promotion. Captain Campbell succeeds to the Majority, and Lt. Paterson, a Waterloo officer, who gets the vacant troop, will resign the Adjutancy of the 7th. Capt. Campbell will have to resign his situation on the Staff of Lord Sydenham, Governor General of Canada.
The income of late Captain R. A. Reynolds, 11th Hussars, is £300 a year. He is one of twelve children, but when his youngest brother, now ten years old, comes of age, the ex-Captain will have £3000 a year.
The pall bearers at Major Jenkins' funeral were Captains Jones and Douglas, Lieuts. Bambrick, and Weguelin, 11th Hussars.
The dress of Field Officers of Infantry is to be altered according to the following pattern:—They are to wear a pouch belt and box, similar to that worn by Light Cavalry, a plume and sabretash, and their horse appointments are in every respect to correspond with those of officers of Light Dragoons. Surgeons and Assistant-Surgeons of Infantry are to wear straight black cocks' hackle in the hat, 18 inches long.
There is to be an immediate change between the stations of Barrack-Masters in England, Ireland and Scotland.
The Master-General has nominated Lieut.-Col. Peter M. Wallace, Royal Artillery, to succeed Lt.-Col. Hunt in command of the Artillery in the Ulster district.
The first division of the 1st Rifle Brigade, from Windsor, arrived in London, by rail-road, on Monday, and this morning embarked at Deptford in the *Abercrombie* Robinson, for Malta.
The first division of the 79th left Weedon, to embark for the Mediterranean, at Deptford, yesterday.
An Ensign of the 17th has been obliged to resign his commission.
The Serjeant-Major of the 61st is promoted to a commission in the 17th Regt.
The Officers and men of the 74th Depot are great favourites at Waterford.
Lieutenant G. Erskine, 33rd has got the Adjutancy held by Lieutenant, now Captain Williamson, promoted under the regulations of the late Commission. Lieut. Wood, 54th, is appointed Adjutant, vice Holt, promoted, under same circumstances.
General orders have issued from the Horse Guards to raise a regiment in Canada, to be called "The Royal Canadian Regiment."
Captain Thomas Gleeson, late 90th, Proprietor of the *Mayo Mercury*, and formerly Sub-Inspector of the Constabulary at Carlow and Castlebar, is appointed Barrackmaster at the Bahama Islands.
Cornet Hill, 6th Dragoon Guards, is the officer alluded to as under difficulties, and whom his commanding officer was obliged to report to the Horse Guards.
The Royal Canal Company charged a penalty of 10s. each, for the escort accompanying the baggage of the 92d Depot from Mullingar to Dublin, last summer; per Messrs. McCann, canal boat.
Lieut. Lord Glenlyon, Scots Greys, Lieut. Faber, 14th Dragoons, Ensign Hay, 80th, and Lieut. Hutchinson, 2d West India Regt. sold out of the Service on Friday.
The late Mr. Vigors, M.P., when a Second Lieutenant in the Guards, was severely wounded in the knee at the Battle of Barossa. He was carrying the colours at the time.
Capt. Chearnley, 8th, or King's, has lamed himself by fracture of the kneecap, hunting deer at Halifax.
Three of the 9th Regt. died in one day, of excessive heat of the climate at Bengal, last August.
Capt. Warburton, 47th, has arrived from Malta in charge of invalids of the 47th, 77th, and 92d Regts.
The *Pastillon* gun brig is employed receiving men for the Navy on the Cork coast.
Mr. Cuming, mate of the *Cyclops*, war steamer, volunteered to lead the Turkish force to the assault and capture of Sidon, in which gallant feat he succeeded. Commodore Napier, in one of the Gorgon's boats, had got under the breach, and was nearly up to his armpits in water, making a scaling ladder of the shoulders of his boat's crew. Within half an hour the fort was in possession of the Sultan's troops.
There are now on the stocks, or launched and nearly ready for sea service, two ships of 120 guns, three of 110, one of 92, five of 90, eight of 80, one of 78, two of 70, one of 50, six of 36, seven of 26, two of 20, eight of 16, and eight of ten guns each.
The late Admiral Fleming, Governor of the Royal Hospital, Greenwich, left an only son, Ensign Fleming, 71st Light Infantry.
Lieut. Ross Connor, R. N. is appointed to the command of the *Skylark* revenue cruiser, on the Milford station, vice Lieut. Antridge, whose period has terminated, and who succeeds Lieut. Connor, as Chief Officer of Coast Guard at Pembroke Dock.
The last N. & M. Gazette, which is filled with our military news of the *previous* post, contains a notable discovery, viz. that the *Limerick Chronicle* stated the 76th Depot to have 14 officers, 15 sergeants, and 360 rank and file—whereas the number is *since* altered to 16 officers, 15 sergeants, and 341 rank and file. Wonderful disparity! The same Paper in the subsequent paragraph literally authenticates our original statement!!
Gen. Sir Joseph Stratton, late 6th Dragoon Guards, left £70,000 to the Edinburgh University.
The Bengal rupee is now the fixed standard of pay to our troops in the three Presidencies.
The command of the Royal Marines at Ascension Island, is vacant by the death of Capt. Tucker, R. M. John Morrison, the tenant of Lord Lorton, who was murdered on his return from Drumlish fair, as stated in our last, served many years in the 85th Light Infantry, and was discharged a pensioner from that regiment. Government offer £150 reward for discovery of the murderers.

Major R. Mackintosh, barrack-master, Gibraltar, is to be removed to Barbadoes.
The command of the Royal Military Asylum, Southampton, held by the late Col. Evatt, formerly of the 50th, is not worth more than £350 a year.
The usual half-yearly public examination of the officers and gentleman cadets, studying at the Royal Military College, took place on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday last. Lieuts. De Havilland, 55th; Carden, 41st; and Simmons, 72nd Regiments, were presented with certificates of the highest class. The following 18 gentlemen cadets, who had completed their qualifications for commissions, were recommended:—Frederic S. Daubeny, John J. Hort, Hon. Ernest F. N. Fane, Morton G. Mansel, Henry E. Montresor, George Wilson, Maximilian M. Hammond, Augustus Bolton, George Clapcott, Francis W. Newdigate, William T. Granville, Henry S. M. D. Fulton, Richard Anderson, John F. Brickdale, Richard M. Lucas, Alexander J. Sutherland, John G. Bolton, Charles J. Carmichael.
Tuesday, the Lord Bishop of Limerick preached in the Church of Maryborough, to a highly respectable and crowded congregation, in his usual eloquent and impressive style.
The Archdeacon of Ardfert, Chaplain to the Lord Lieutenant, preached an eloquent and impressive discourse on Sunday last, at the Chapel Royal, Dublin.
The Bishop of Meath (see unfilled) is, *ex-officio*, a Privy Councillor of Ireland, and takes precedence next to the Primate and Archbishop of Dublin.
It is the living of Ventry, not Dingle, to which Mr. Crosbie, of Ardfert, has presented the Rev. Mr. Gayer. The Rev. Edward Spring is appointed from the curacy of Berehaven, Cork, to Dunurlin, in this county, on the nomination of the Rev. Charles Gayer.
The Rev. Archibald Douglas, Rector of Cootehill, a liberal, is appointed Chaplain to the Lord Lieutenant.
The Roman Catholics of Athenry have subscribed to present the Rev. John Burke, Roman Catholic Curate, a piece of plate.
The Lord Chancellor has appointed John Tuomy, Esq. M.D., to the Commission of the Peace for Carlow.
The Rev. M. Keiran, of Drogheda, preached at St. Patrick's Chapel, Belfast, on Sunday in aid of the National Education Schools, when £100 was collected.
Father Mathew arrived at Cashel yesterday, and preaches in Dublin next Sunday.
Dr. Cullen, President of the Irish College at Rome, is on a visit with Dr. Foran, R. C. Bishop Waterford.
The investigation into the charges preferred by Dr. Lyons, P.P. of Erris, against Mr. Walsh, Sub-Inspector, after a tedious inquiry, occupying seven days, terminated on Saturday.
At Thurles Quarter Sessions on Monday, Robert French, Esq. was convicted of an assault on John Kempston, jun. Esq. Proprietor of the *Nenagh Guardian*, and sentenced to six weeks' imprisonment and a fine of 5l.
The verdict had at Spring Assizes, 1839, by Sir Richard de Burgho, Bart. against Andrew James Watson, Esq. for the robbery of the Island at Castle Connell, was yesterday set aside by the Court of Exchequer.
The Lord Lieutenant has appointed Thomas O'Connor Donelan, of Silane, Esq. a magistrate of the county Galway.
Messrs. T. S. Reeves, E. Gould, John and G. Wheatley, have withdrawn from the Committee of Markets, Cork, on the butter shipping regulations.
The rich Mr. Fanning's only son, married but two years, died on Monday at Pembroke-road, Dublin.
At a meeting of the Corporation of Belfast, on Wednesday, Robt. Gordon, Esq. was elected a Burgess and appointed Constable of the Castle of Belfast, in the room of George Joy, Esq. resigned. Mr. John Montgomery, Solicitor, was, at same time, sworn in as Deputy Town Clerk.
TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.
Waterford, 7th Nov. 1840.
Sir.—Some Newspaper reports of what was said of me at a late dinner in Waterford, appeared so absurd and incredible, that I thought they did not require from me any notice; but as the Editor of the *Waterford Mail* states that the outraged feelings of the Protestants under my charge demand from me an explanation; though I never did or said anything to hurt the feelings of one of them, and though as a Bishop and a citizen, I thought I was favoured with the good opinion of all classes in Waterford, still I feel constrained to enter into a detail which ought not to have been imposed on me. I must, however, previously express my conviction, that the statements as reported, could not have been made by Mr. O'Connell.
In a letter to me on College business, in the year 1836, before I had ceased to be a Fellow of the College, Mr. O'Connell was pleased to add:—"The greatest compliment ever paid to me in my life was an egregious lie; it was that I contemplated to make you a Bishop; but though I had nothing to do with that matter, none of your relatives is more rejoiced than I am at your well deserved promotion." I have not a copy of my reply; I of course thanked him for his flattering sentiments towards me, but I was not so insincere as to state that he made me a Bishop, the fact being that I was appointed to a Bishopric before Mr. O'Connell knew of the vacancy, and that I never sought that station through the influence of any human being, or by any application from myself.
The report represents me to have spoken offensively towards the Bench of Bishops, respecting Judge Perrin's evidence in the Committee of the Lords on the state of Ireland. I was never in any Committee on the state of Ireland. Judge Perrin was not examined before any Committee of which I was a member, and I never uttered in any Committee anything which could offend the Bench of Bishops, with several of whom I had the honor of a very kind and friendly intercourse; and though a single Bishop may feel reason to complain, if attacked by unseen assailants, surely the whole Bench of Bishops, supported by the Temporal Peers, if assailed by the humblest individual amongst them face to face, may be presumed to have been more than adequate to the vindication of their own dignity, without being obliged to wait nearly four years for the arrival of succour in the *Waterford Mail*. I never had a vote in Kerry. Your obedient servant,

There is not a resident Magistrate in the town of Roscommon. Mr. Crossley, Stipendiary, travels 50 miles every fortnight to attend Petty Sessions there.
The Wicklow copper and sulphur mines yield a produce of £30,000 a year.
An application will be made to Parliament to amend the Dublin and Kilkenny Railway Act.
Mr. O'Connell is invited by the Trades of this city, to attend a meeting for the encouragement of Irish manufacture.
Mr. Staunton, of the *Register*, is reported, by the *Leinster Express*, for a seat at the Poor-law Board as Commissioner. It is said Mr. Nicholls retires.
Col. Bruen is elected chairman of the Carlow Poor-law Guardians.
Mr. Michael Moran is elected Clerk to the South Dublin Poor Law Union, vice Geratty, deceased.
The Waterford Guardians are to admit the Press to their meetings from Saturday next.
Mr. and Mrs. O'Connor, from London, are appointed Master and Matron of Belfast workhouse.
Mark Blake, of Ballinacree, Esq. has addressed the electors of Mayo, and tells them that Dr. M'Hale and the Independent Club have selected him as the candidate to represent the County—of course, he will "go the whole hog!" This *Independent* gentleman on after "passing his examination before the Club" says he will "Vote for Repeal of the Legislative Union, extension of the suffrage, vote by ballot, triennial parliaments, total extinction of the tithe rent charge, the appropriation of the surplus revenues of the Established Church to the purposes of general education—and for a just proportion of the funds voted by Parliament for national education in Ireland to the uses of Connaught, under the control of the legitimate pastors of the people."
It is remarkable that Messrs. Willans, the extensive English wholesale house, Dublin, are for several years past the principle manufacturers of Irish woolen goods.
The Queen's Bench has granted a conditional order for a new trial in Reilly v. Lawton, an action by a pedlar at Cork assizes, against a Magistrate, for false arrest. In *Walsh v. Waterford Mail*, there is a conditional order for new trial.
Mr. Edward Tanner is appointed Landing Surveyor at Waterford.
Two bags of Portuguese gold coin, value £4000, consigned from Lisbon to Mr. Hartley, of the Dublin Steam Wharf, the sufferer by the gold dust robbery, were stolen in transitu on the Thames, last week.
Col. Creighton, Lieutenant of Fermanagh, and several Magistrates attended in inquiry at Newton Butler courthouse, on Wednesday last, relative to some expressions made use of by a Roman Catholic Curate of the town, the Rev. Mr. M'Anna, concerning a burning which took place at the hotel there in Oct. last, during the Quarter Sessions. The inquiry was private, and the Rev. Mr. M'Anna attended. The result has not transpired; but it is understood he did not deny the expressions made use of in presence of several Gentlemen, while the burning was going on; he exhorted the people to come off the house, as is reported, and let it burn down; and some reported he had said "let it burn the town." Newton Butler is a Protestant town, one of the greatest in Fermanagh, with the exception of Enniskillen. The Rev. Mr. M'Anna has been a very good character, and we believe the expressions made use of were at the moment, for want of thought, more than from any other motive.
The inhabitants of Caher have presented an address to Mr. Louis Anderson, County Inspector of Police, on his removal to Letterkenny.
Four lambs belonging to Henry Keane, Esq. were killed on Thursday night at Beechpark, Ennis. Their legs were broken and the wool stripped off them.
A steple chase comes off on the 10th of February between the Marquis of Waterford and John Power Esq. of Gurteen.
Lord Waterford's hounds meet to-morrow at Turtulla, and Saturday at Bansa.
MR. STEELE'S PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT.—We have had a letter from our fellow-citizen and friend, Mr. Steele, informing us that it is his intention to deposit in the hands of the Chamberlain of Limerick, a map, and a description of the details of the plan for the improvement of this city, which was proposed by him in a general form in his letter to Lord Gort, published last week in our columns.
Master Grossmith performs at the Theatre, Limerick, this evening. We anticipate he will again be honored by an overflowing house.
