#### THE CORN TRADE.

Wednesday, a public meeting, called by requisition to the High Sheriff, at the desire of the Committee of the Farming Society of Limerick, was held in the Court House Ennis. In the absence of the High Sheriff, who was detained in Dublin, Stafford A. O'Brien, Esq. of Cratlee, was called to the chair, and mentioned, that the object of the meeting was to call upon the landed interest of Clare to join with the landed interest of Limerick, to protect from the exactions practised in the markets, the farmers, particularly the small farmers, who were less able to protect themselves from the frauds committed.

Mr. Marshall, Secretary of the Farming Society in Limerick, addressed the meeting, and detailed many of the frauds practised upon the farmers at the different sales in the way of allowances, beamage, &c.

Thomas Crowe, Esq. said it did not appear to him that a public scale was required in Ennis. and the custom belonged to Colonel Wyndham, and he had erected a public scale for weighing corn, but the people refused to go there, and they preferred going to the different stores in town, where those frauds were said to be committed, and even in some of them pay those same tolls that they refused to pay at the scales erected by him. The consequence was, that the scales not bringing in as much as the bire of the persons sent to weigh amounted to, were of necessity taken down
The meeting broke up, having passed the resolu-

tions which appears in our advertising columns.

Admiral the Hon. Sir Robert Stopford, G. C. B. third son of James, second Earl of Courtown, by Mary his wife, daughter and co-heir of Richard Poweys, Esq. of Hintlesham, Suffolk, was born the 5th of February, 1768, and entering the navy at an early age, served in the Prince of Orange, bearing the flag of Rear Admiral Digby, on the American station. married in 1809 Mary daughter of Commissioner Fanshaw, of the Plymouth dock-yard, and has several children. Admiral Stopford obtained twice the thanks of Parliament, for his gallant services affoat, during the late war.

Count Nugent, an Irishman, attached to the Ottoman forces at St. Jean d'Acre, was the very first to enter that fortress after the destructive explosion, and he was followed immediately after to the citadel by the Austrian Archduke.

Two entire Regiments were annihilated by the explosion of the powder magazine at St. Jean d'Acre, and it is reported as the most awful catastrophe of the kind known in modern warfare. Lieut. Le Mesurier, of the Talbot, who was killed at

the bomardment St. Jean d'Acre, was the son of the late Rev. Mr. Le Mesurier, Fellow of New College, Oxford, and rector of Horton, Yorkshire.

St. Jean d'Acre is celebrated in history. Its scriptural name is Accho; the Greeks called it Ptolemais. In 1190 King Richard the First of England (Cœur de Lion) took it after a vigorous siege, and made five thousand prisoners. It was at Acre that Edward the First received the wound in his arm by a poisoned arrow, the venom of which, it is said, Queen Eleanor sucked from the wound at the hazard of her own life. In 1799 Bonaparte was foiled there by Sir Sidney Smith and his brave companions in arms.
