### Corn Trade in Clare.

AT a Meeting of the Landed Interest of the County of Clare, held at the County Court House, Ennis, on Wednesday, the 2d day of December 1840 and called by Requisition to the High Sheriff, in whose absence being unavoidably detained in Dublin, Stafford A. O'Brien, was called to the Chair.
