We annex a copy of the affidavit of Mr. Steele:—County of Antrim, to wit. The informations of Thomas Steele, Esq. of the County of Clare, who, being duly sworn, states that he was this evening sitting in the room in which Daniel O'Connell, Esq. and his friends have dined the last two days, when both windows were broken with stones thrown from the street, and many other windows of the hotel, as informant heard and believes. Informant being under a decisive impression that said stones were thrown by an Orange mob, with intent to murder said Daniel O'Connell, or to do him some bodily harm, claims from the Magistrates of Belfast the protection which ought to be afforded to the said Daniel O'Connell under such circumstances, by granting a sufficient guard for this night, and protection to the place of his embarkation.

The speakers, including the movers and seconders of the resolutions at this noble display of constitutional and loyal feeling, were his Lordship, the High Sheriff of Antrim, High Sheriff Downshire, Right Hon. George R. Dawson, Lord Gernon Chichester, Colonel Verner, M.P., the High Sheriff of Fermanagh, Lord Hillsborough, M.P., Lord Mount Newry, J. E. Tennent, M.P., Col. Close, G. Anbar, M.P., Sir R. Bateson, M.P., Lord Loftus, Sir A. Cooke, Sir A. Brooke, M. P., Sir Harvey Bruce, the High Sheriff of Tyrone, the Dean of Ross, Capt. Jones, M. P. &c. &c. The meeting, comprising at least, 1600 persons, was enthusiastic and unanimous.
