PRIVATE CORRESPONDENCE.

 "London, January 28."

"Your readers now have the Royal Speech at the commencement of the Session. It is pretty well ascertained, that Lord Howick and Mr. Charles Wood will avail themselves of Lord Morpeth's notice to bring in his bill for the regulation of the Irish Franchise, to decline supporting Lord Stanley's measure, this Session. The secession of the Noble Lord and the Hon. Member will justify an important section of the Grey party, in standing aloof from Lord Stanley during the progress of his bill. This must prove fatal to it, unless the defection be counteracted by the great increase of Conservative strength, which we anticipate, indeed, from the late elections, and the present pending ones. The Morning Chronicle of this day is ominously dispirited on their result. In an article on the approaching East Surrey contest, that organ of the Whig Ministry admits that the "County representation of England is neither with the Court or the Government." The Walsall and Canterbury seats, now vacant, are in the scale, and by the vexatious interposition of the Radicals, may be lost to the Whigs. East Surrey may be calculated on as lost. Yet, with all these adverse circumstances in their path, the Downing-street officials are in hopes of a successful struggle. It is not expected that they will surrender while they have even the chance of a majority of one left. The most active steps are being taken to whip up the absentees of last Session to the division post during this. Colonel Fitzgibbon, our County Member, is expected this day at Belgrave-square, from the Continent. Mr. Maher, of Wexford, who has been at Malta for the recovery of his health, is anticipated, will also be in town, in time to give his vote for Lord Morpeth's bill, and against Lord Stanley's. But, if the Whigs win, it will be "by a ostril" as the jockey phrase goes.
 "The parliamentary business has been dull, beyond all previous precedent during the two evenings of debate. However this is but a lull antecedent to a gathering storm. The studious reserve of her Majesty's Ministers in the Royal speech, has cut off all ground of censure; for anything expressed, as Sir Robert Peel said, "it was remarkable for concealing thoughts." It appears that Mr. O'Connell's manoeuvres in Ireland were too despicable to need especial mention. See Lord John Russell's reply to Sir H. Inglis, last night. This is good policy, and a generous course of action; for as Ministers do not pay Mr. O'Connell for his support—at least in hard cash, though he commands patronage in every department—they do well to tolerate him in earning a handsome income by litigation. As I observed to you in my last, all parties, especially "the Duke," united in approval of Lord Palmerston's diplomatic doings; but, in the Home Department there are breakers a-head, which show at shelves—aye, and formidable ones—are near."
