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present rulers suspect that the w...
will administer their patronage so as to abuse the
functions confided to them, and thereby bring discredit
on the political party which has acquired for them
power to which they are strangers, and not competent
perhaps to exercise with integrity and discretion, is a
matter between themselves and the Whig Government,
and at all events it has originated very strange conjec-
tures here.

"Archbishop M'Hale's fierce antipathy to the National
System of Education in Ireland, is caused by one of
the Commissioners of that Board having by his influ-
ence opposed the nomination of that Arch Prelate to
the See of Tuam, and though both of the same com-
munion, they are political enemies ever since.

"The only result from the judicial pageantry of Lord
Cardigan's trial, will be an assemblage of the *élite* of

ment; upon which, no witnesses appearing against the
accused Peer, the fashionable gathering will break up,
and the expense, some few thousand pounds, will be
entailed on the country. But these pomps are not
without a salutary tendency. In his Lordship's case
they will serve to bring a restless and irritable noble-
man before the bar of public opinion, one who has
many good traits, though spoiled by his ungracious
manner to those near his own rank.

"You will regret exceedingly to hear, and so will
every good soldier who has the honourable profession
of arms at heart, that a journal, under the name of
the *Alligator*, has been got up here for the express
purpose of lacerating the feelings and maligning the
fame of Lord Cardigan upon every occasion that offers
itself, and every post this vile party vehicle is stuffed
with low abuse and gross misrepresentation of that
nobleman. I fear some officers who served in the
11th, are covertly associated with this slanderous ve-
hicle, but though it may suit a base temporary object,
the scandalous organ will soon recoil with disgrace
upon its managers. The noble Lord is prepared to
meet an adversary in the open field, but the assassins
are concealed from exposure and punishment.
