

James Daly, indicted for stealing a cow, the property of Catherine Lyons, of Grena, was also convicted, the person who purchased the cow having identified him as the seller.

Anna Maria Griffin was indicted under the vagrancy act, but the evidence not being sufficient, she was acquitted.

Jeremiah Kenny was indicted for that he, with others, on the 16th January last, at Ballingarry, did assault the habitation of Johanna Feighney, a widow, and carry her away, with intent to compel her to marry his brother, Thomas Kenny.

The prisoner was found guilty.

Thomas Kiely indicted for stealing a mare and gelding, the property of William Histon, of Shannagolden, pleaded guilty.

James Madigan, for stealing a pig, the property of Patrick Fenton, of Ardpatrick, was found guilty.

Michael Marnix was indicted for assaulting the habitation of Michael Molony, clerk of Petty Sessions at Patrick's-Well, last December. Not Guilty.

William English was indicted for indecently exposing his person on the public road at Turah, near Abington, on 22d May last. Not Guilty.

Robert Aldworth was indicted for the manslaughter of John Barry, at Duntrileague, on the 6th of August last. From the evidence it appeared the parties disputed about the right of turbarry, and the prisoner, who had a knife in his hand cutting turf struck the deceased, having previously received a blow from him. Verdict—Guilty.

At six o'clock the Court rose, to sit at nine o'clock next morning.

CITY COURT—FRIDAY, FEB. 27.

Judge Crampton entered Court at 9 o'clock this morning, and the long panel having been called over, the following Jury were sworn:—

William Glover, Thomas J. Boyd, B. M'Nulty, John Lucas Joseph Tuthill, Patrick Goulding, Edward Deane, Daniel M'Carthy, John Benson, Patt O'Gorman, John Dallas.

Mary Mayer was indicted for stealing two tubs, the property of Wm. Gleeson.—Not Guilty.

Patrick Kelly pleaded guilty for the same offence, and acknowledged that he brought the woman into it. To be imprisoned 6 months at hard labour.

John Foley and Richard M'Mahon were indicted for having committed a rape on Margaret Evans, at Ryan's-lane, on the 28th Nov. last.

Margaret Evans sworn, and examined by Mr. Plunkett—Is a married woman, this 9 years; has been "on the town" for some time; remembers the 28th of Nov.; was in Boherbuoy that evening with a person named Edward Poe, and some sailors; knew Poe long before; went out to Mrs. Howard's, and met Mr. Poe and four sea Captains; drank a glass of porter; they all went to Mrs. Mayne's house in Boherbuoy, where a girl named Hannah Sheedy was; when coming out she met the prisoners at the end of the lane; Foley came up and asked her for some money; she gave them 2s. 6d.; was afraid she would be killed; they ran towards Poe and the Captains; they asked Poe for money and he refused them; they met her again at the corner of Queen-street; Foley caught her, and M'Mahon held her while Foley ill-used her; there was a small ring on her finger, and Foley took it off; screamed several times, and Foley attempted to choke her; after that a man came to her assistance; Foley struck her a blow and ran off.

After a humorous cross-examination by Mr. Freeman of the prosecutrix, in which her conduct on the evening in question, and also her previous character and mode of life were elicited as not very creditable, or calculated to add to her veracity, the Jury intimated that they had heard sufficient to induce them to make up their minds to acquit the prisoner of the capital charge.

The Jury acquitted both prisoners.

Patrick Burke was indicted for having, in the exercise of his dealings as a Corn-factor, used certain scales and weights, and by means thereof, having unlawfully deprived one Martin Murnane of a certain portion of his property—to wit, a quantity of wheat sold by him to said Patrick Burke.

Mr. Freeman demurred to the form of the indictment, as containing an offence unknown to the statute law, inasmuch as it was not using false weights.

The witnesses for the prosecution were Martin Murnane, John Keane, Police Constable D. Cornelius, and Thos. P. Vokes, Esq. who proved the offence distinctly by the prisoner against the farmer, and the Jury found him Guilty.—Trial at fall in our next.

SENTENCE OF DEATH!

Michael Fitzpatrick was then brought up to receive his fatal sentence.

Mr. Costello, D. C. P. having asked the prisoner if he had anything to say why sentence of death and execution of the law should not be passed on him, the prisoner said "I have nothing to say, my Lord but that I never threw the stone!"

His Lordship then addressed him as follows:—Michael Fitzpatrick; you have been indicted for the wilful murder of Daniel Griffin, and notwithstanding your present protestation, after a long and patient

Court—Very well, Mr. Freeman, you will follow your own course, but I have nothing to do with it.

Mr. Bennett applied to the Court to order a Presentment for money advanced by Government to meet the expense of the Insurrection Act in the City and Liberties in 1815-16.

The Hon. J. P. Vereker, Foreman of the City Grand Jury, stated that the Grand Jury on referring to their books, had discovered that the money raised by presentment was levied and paid at the time, and he contended it would be an extreme hardship to compel the rate payers again to pay it, after such a lapse of years.

Mr. Bennett read the certificate of the Chief Remembrancer, from which it appeared that no payment had been made of that sum.

The Court said it was imperative on the Grand Jury to present the amount, or in the event of a refusal, he should feel bound to make an order, which would have the same effect.

The Presentment was then granted, and the money is to be paid by instalments.

The Criminal business of the City having been concluded, his Lordship took up the County Records.

The first case was *Mathew Reddan v. the Rev. Standish Parker and William Parker*, an action to recover price of a quantity of oats plaintiff's property, taken out of a boat by violence at Garryduff, parish of Castletown, and county of Tipperary, and the action was brought under the Whiteboy Act. 24 Geo. 3rd, Cap. 20, which gave a power to the party injured to obtain compensation from any inhabitant of the parish, who might afterwards recover it by assessment on the parish or county at large. Damages were laid at £600.

Verdict for Plaintiff, £476 damages, and 6d. costs. The Court rose immediately after.

Both Judges are this day engaged in Records and Crown trials. The case of Alderman Crips v. Capt. Smith, Carbineers, an action on a Bill of Exchange for £150, the price of a horse sold and delivered, but which Defendant alleges to have been unsound and faulty, occupies Judge Crampton, and is not likely to be over until a late hour this evening. The following convictions have taken place before Sergeant Greene:—David Gallagher for coining, William and Patrick M'Mahon, assaulting the house of Edward Bagot, Philip Fitzgerald, malicious arson of the dwelling of Bridget Fennessy, alias Dooly, at Millfarm. The prisoner, a very flippant advocate, conducted his own defence, but unfortunately committed himself, like many others, by saying too much. Jeremiah Murphy, stealing money from Wm. Wall.

Six o'Clock.—Crips v. Smyth.—Verdict for Plaintiff, £150 damages, with interest, and 6d. costs.
