On Monday morning last, at his residence in Nenagh, in the 67th year of his age, most deeply lamented by all who had the privilege of his acquaintance, the Rev. Thomas Hawkesworth, Rector of Kiltuane. Mr. Hawkesworth was a contemporary of the celebrated Dean Kirwan, and, like that benefactor of his age, turned the current of many thousands from the whirlpools of vanity and vice into the blessed channels of charity and beneficence. In his latter years he repaired every season to his Lodge at Kiltuane, and, despite the depressing influence of many infirmities, this good man largely contributed by his conversation and public discourses to the spiritual improvement of the wealthy and intellectual, while the wants of the poor and ignorant were pleaded with such feeling and eloquence every year, as to secure the hearty co-operation and willing contribution of every benevolent visitor. The anxiety with which he husbanded his failing strength for this appeal, and the struggles which it cost him, have been deeply engraved in the memory of the mourning visitor of this hasty sketch, by the local allusion in which his ever-venerated friend described them—'Perhaps another gun may yet be fired from the wreck of the Intrinsic!' Mr. Hawkesworth's talents, piety and usefulness received no mark of honor from the Dispensers of Church patronage. The silver box presented by the Roomkeepers' Society, was the only token he received while living, and probably no "storied urn or animated bust" will commemorate him after death, but his bereaved widow, and sorrowing friends and relatives, should remember that, looking to and preaching Christ Himself, he surely now rests in His—the only substantial ground of joy, and his memory lies embalmed in the hearts of many who will reach their little ones by this example—to do good, hoping for nothing again, that thus they may yet share that good man's smile, and be partners of his bliss.
