regions, look to Ireland and cultivate her capabilities  
of production, which will yield abundant remuneration  
and revenue for whatever skill may be employed, or  
whatever amount of money may be expended; let  
reciprocity and harmony prevail between the two  
countries; let but a portion of the mighty and multi-  
farious energies of England be imparted to the muscle  
of Ireland, so as that her vigorous and untiring  
sons may live by their labour, and be saved from  
the humiliation of poor house relief—let but these  
things or even some of them be done, and then the  
Repealers will be dumb—the Union permanently  
secured—a new and superior order of men will supply  
the place of the blighting absentees—the arts and  
sciences be fostered—trade and manufactures en-  
couraged; visionary theorists may then rave away  
unheeded, and sordid politicians rapidly declaim to  
“the idle winds.”
