The following are the addresses agreed on: To the Right Honourable and Honourable the Commons of the United Kingdom, in the present Parliament assembled.

"The Petition of the Citizens of Limerick, presented at a public meeting convened by the Worshipful Henry Vereker Lloyd, Esq. on the 4th day of May, 1841.

"HUMBLY SHEWETH—That your Petitioners, being informed with great astonishment and regret, that the Act for Improving the Navigation of the Shannon, a part of so much importance, and so greatly in the interest of the City of Limerick, should have been precluded from all participation in the execution of the munificent loan ordered by your Honourable House. That your Petitioners beg leave respectfully to refer your Honourable House to the Report of the Committee of the Shannon, prepared in 1832, by C. Mudge, R. N., and printed by order of your Honourable House, wherein the ruinous obstruction impeding the Navigation of said River, the Sea to Limerick, are set forth, together with the statement of the trifling expense of removing them, and the important advantages which would result to the trade and revenue therefrom. That your Petitioners beg leave to inform your Honourable House, that owing to the unsafe and insecure state of their Port, the damage to shipping in two years alone amounted to upwards of £24,000. That your Petitioners consider it to be a great injustice to be obliged as they are, to contribute a considerable portion of the loan granted by your Honourable House, while they at the same time are exempted from enjoying the least advantages of its expenditure. And your Petitioners, therefore, earnestly implore your Hon. House to take such representations into your immediate consideration, and so to amend said Act, as that the grievous hardship complained of may be removed, a wholesome impetus given to commerce, and employment thereby afforded to the Operatives and Labourers of Limerick—to such measures for alleviating those distresses as your Honourable House may think fit to adopt. And your Petitioners will pray, &c.

To His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant General, the General Governor of Ireland, &c. &c. &c. The Memorial of the Citizens of Limerick, adopted at a Public Meeting, convened by the Right Worshipful Henry Vereker Lloyd, Esq. Mayor, on Tuesday the 4th day of May, 1841.

"HUMBLY SHEWETH—That for many years past the Prosperity of the several Trades of Limerick has been in a state of rapid decline. The present distressed condition of the Operatives of Limerick consequent on the almost total absence of employment, has scarcely ever been paralleled at any season of the year, and your Memorialists therefore deem it their imperative duty to inform your Excellency, that a large number of the Trades of Limerick, able and intelligent men, despairing of procuring employment at home, are anxious to emigrate if afforded the necessary facility for so doing. Your Memorialists, in laying the wishes of the Operatives of their City before your Excellency, entreat for the most favourable consideration and aid which your Excellency is ever ready to afford, and which the present exigency so urgently demands. This object may be partially attained by causing a Vessel to be sent to the Port of Limerick, for the purpose of taking Emigrants, free of expense, to New South Wales.—Signed on behalf of the Meeting,
