

the meeting from mere inclination, but at the request of a portion of his fellow-citizens. A deputation from the mechanics waited on him, with an earnest hope that he would say something in their behalf (hear.) With pleasure he acceded to their request, as he was always desirous to advance the interests and welfare of his fellow man; but on this occasion he considered that no lover of his country, or his religion, could stand back, while a fellow creature was in a state of destitution, and sought relief (hear.) He was glad to say, that he never met a class of people more deserving than the inhabitants of Limerick, having always been so, and he felt equally happy at seeing the Mayor, presiding over such a meeting. This, following up the example of his predecessors, the respected Aldermen, who were then sitting on the bench, and who had before raised the people beyond the pangs of poverty (loud cheers.) Alderman Watson said he had a resolution to propose, which he was sure would meet the approval of the meeting, and he was of opinion that until it had been read, many of those whom he addressed were ignorant that above £500,000 was granted by Parliament for the improvement of the River Shannon, one of which vast sum could not be expended in the City of Limerick.—(Hear.) Now, he was contented that an energetic application to Government, supported by their representatives, would induce them to facilitate the amendment of the Shannon Navigation so as to extend the new splendid line of quays to the north side of the river, and thus confer a permanent benefit on our port, while yielding large employment to the industrious tradesman and labourer. This was the object which he had in view, and those works were directed in this quarter, where the outlay could be most properly made, the advantages would be incalculable. (hear.) He was contented that by such an application, enforcing the law of Limerick to a part of this public grant, and reducing the state of destitution to which the artisans were reduced, the act could be so amended this very year as to have the desired works in active operation before the close of summer. (hear.) In consequence he could assure his fellow-citizens that no one was more inclined than he was to promote every measure likely to benefit his native city, and all its inhabitants. Alderman Keating briefly seconded the proposition. William Lloyd, proposed the next resolution, through a comparative stranger, no one felt more than he did to see the urgent wants of the mechanics classes alleviated. William H. Hall seconded the resolution. A memorial to the Government, requesting their aid to relieve the wants of the mechanics labourers, was next agreed to, after which J. B. Alton, Secretary to the Board of Trade, made an interesting address from that body to their Committee. A Committee was appointed, and the Mayor was moved from the chair, and Alderman Watson called thereto, the thanks of the meeting were given to his Worship with acclamation. The Mayor said he was much obliged for the manner in which they conveyed to him their approbation. The meeting then separated. The resolutions appear in our columns.
