PROCESS SERVERS.

Suitors are recommended to deliver their writs for service twelve days before the first of the respective Sessions, in cases where the demand exceeds that sum. Suitors taking this precaution incur the risk of being served with costs.

The Process Servers are directed to appear in front of each Process the Barony to which they are directed, and on pain of being dismissed, must appear at nine o'clock in the morning, at the Court-house on the day preceding the first day of the Session in each Town, and remain in attendance until six o'clock in the evening.

CIVIL BILLS.

The Clerk of the Peace will not receive Civil Bills (whether Ejectments, Legacy Suits, or any account whatever, after Six o'clock in the evening before the first day of the Session in each Town, and it is requested that all Civil Bills, of every kind, be delivered to the Clerk of the Peace in the Alphabetical order of the names, and in separate parcels, according to the respective Baronies. Civil Bills will be heard at nine o'clock in the morning, immediately after the Registry of Voters, in each Town.

At Rathkeale—Kerry first, Coshma second, Connelloe third, and Upper Connelloe fourth.
At Bruff—Costlea first, Small County second, Ma third, Clanwilliam fourth, Pubble fifth, Oweybeg sixth, and Coonagh seventh.

Ejectments, Replevins, Suits for Legacies, and all other Civil Bills, will be heard without distinction, and like other Civil Bills, in the Alphabetical order of the names, in their respective Baronies.

Ejectments cannot be made returnable until the first day of the Sessions in each town.

Applicants for Registry as Voters will appear at nine o'clock in the morning of the first day of the Sessions in each town, and are requested to give their Notices the respective Towns at which they intend to apply.

CROWN BUSINESS.

The Grand Jury will be sworn at Rathkeale on Monday, June 21, at 12 o'clock, and at Bruff on Tuesday, June 22, at Nine o'clock.

The Grand Jury will be sworn at Bruff on Wednesday, June 23, at 12 o'clock, and the Petit Jury on Thursday, June 24, at Nine o'clock.

The Grand and Petit Jurors will be called at nine o'clock, and Warrants forthwith issued against defaulters. Appeals, from Magistrates' convictions, will be heard at Nine o'clock in the morning at Rathkeale, on Monday, June 21, and at Bruff, on Tuesday, June 29.

Applications for Spirit Licenses and for the Arms will be heard immediately after the Grand Jury has been sworn. No application for the Arms will be heard, unless accompanied by a Certificate of Approval, signed by two Magistrates, or by the Petty Sessions, nearest to the residence of the applicant, or the absence of such certificates will be accounted for.

CLERKS OF PETTY SESSIONS.

Are required to return all Informations, and Recognizances, to the Clerk of the Peace within fourteen days after they are taken, and are bound to do, pursuant to the 6th and 7th sections of the 4th and 5th Acts of the 4th year of His Majesty King George IV, cap. 34. sec. 6. Clerks of Petty Sessions are required to comply with this regulation, and in default thereof a Penalty of Five Pounds in each case.
