A few days ago, at his residence, Eyre-square, Galway, much regretted, Captain John Cripps Dennis, h. p. 32d Regt. He was one of the oldest officers in the British service, having entered as Second Lieutenant in the Royal Irish Artillery in 1795, in which corps he served in the West Indies during three years, when it was reduced. He was then placed on half-pay till 1804, when he was called into the Army of Reserve, and thence transferred to the 32d Regiment, in which corps he served at the capture of the Danish fleet at Copenhagen in 1807, and all the succeeding campaigns during the Peninsular war, having been present at the battles of Boles, Vimiera, Salamanca, Tampelona, the Pyrenees, the Nivelle, the Nive, and Orthes; likewise in the operations against the forts of Salamanca and the Castle of Burgos. His remains were interred with military honours in the Cemetery of St. Nicholas, Galway, by the 27th Depot, and his obsequies were attended by a great concourse of the inuabitable, who evinced a deep sympathy with his amiable family, two daughters and a son, whom the gallant veteran has left to deplore his loss.
