Lord Campbell was considered at Westminster to be ill-tempered and discourteous, but since his arrival at the Four Courts his demeanour has been quite otherwise, and golden opinions have been poured on him, by comparison with his predecessor, who has not left an eye to mourn his flight to Stephen's Green, or old Connaught, Bray.

All the Courts in Dublin are closed except the Rolls, where there is an unusual flow of business this is occasioned in a great measure by the anomaly which the present Legislature has created, namely, while they have abridged the charges in Chancery, by placing for patronage all the officers on salaries and abolishing fees, they have left the Exchequer Equity Court unreformed, and subject to the old scale of charges; and as an example, a decree of Chancery will cost four pounds to make up, whilst the Exchequer amounts to £40.

In the Rolls Court, on Friday, an injunction was moved by Mr. Brewster at the instance of a poor man in the Queen's County, to restrain the Marquis of Landsdowne from turning his family on the wide world, under an ejectment obtained in the Barrister's Court. The defence was, that his Lordship had offered the tenant six pounds to enable him and all his family to expatriate to a foreign land. Sir Michael O'Loughlin in giving judgment said, he never would assist a landlord to transport a tenant unless he had right and equity on his side, and granted an injunction against his Lordship, with costs. The Solicitor-General appeared on behalf of the Noble President of the Council.

The credulity of the Bar towards the judgments of the late Chancellor has been exemplified by many ceses being already noted for rehearing before Lord Campbell. Two of them are very remarkable cases, Earl Donoughmore, and Sir J. Fitz-Gerald, to which may be added that of O'Malley and Lord Lucan.

The present Attorney-General of Gibraltar, just

appointed, was, it is strange to say, incarcerated for six months in Kilmainham gaol, for a misdemeanour against the laws. Todd's; against Daniel Moore, for stealing copper nails from Mr. John N. Russell's concerns. Patrick Meyers was fined £5, for trespassing on the fishery of Mr. William Lloyd, at Parteen. Twenty persons living George's street, Patrick street, and William-street, were summoned by Mr. Hackett, Poor-rate Collector, for the amount of the rates, which they were decreed to pay with costs. Mr. Hunt, Grand Jury Cess Collector, also summoned several defaulters, who were decreed accordingly.
