THE MOORILUP ESTATE

In the Vale of Kalgan, County of Plantagenet, George's Sound, WESTERN AUSTRALIA

THE magnificence and security of the Harbour King George's Sound, have so fully established its importance as a Maritime Station, that it is less either to expatiate on its merits, or to compare it with any other port, than to compare it with the nearly midway between New South Wales and Dieman's Land, and the Indian Ocean, it constant resort of vessels navigating those The readiness with which ships can there refit supplied with water and fresh provisions, is well known, that it is no uncommon circumstance for eight or ten sail of vessels to be at anchor in the harbour at one time.

The town of Albany is on the north-east of the Harbour, and now consists of from 100 to 150 substantial houses. Among the trades are Smiths, Masons, Carpenters, Wheelwrights, most other handicrafts, but owing to the increase of stock in the district, labour is in demand, and wages are high.

The Moorilup Estate is situated in the County of Kalgan, in the same county, and about 10 miles north of Albany, and near the line leading to Perth, the seat of Government.

The land in the Vale of Kalgan was among the earliest settlers, which evidence of its superiority. 5903 acres of Moorilup estate was originally granted to Bannister, Esq. one of the first explorers of the Colony, in fee simple, and the remainder to Stirling, Knt, the first Governor, of whom purchased.

By the present Government Regulation the price of land in Western Australia other Australian Colonies, is £1 per acre, the smallest quantity of rural land that can be purchased of the Government is 320 acres.
