William Smith O'Brien, Esq., M.P., is to be
foreman of the County Grand Jury, and the Hon.
John P. Vereker, foreman of the City Grand Jury.
The names shall appear in second edition.

There are five dstringas for the City, and 21 for
the County, in the hands of the Sheriffs at the Assizes.

The Clare Grand Jury, whose names appeared in
our second edition of Wednesday, were sworn yes-
terday at Ennis, before Judge Ball, for Crown busi-
ness. The Nisi Prius cases for trial are but two, and
the criminal calendar is not weighty.

Fitzstephen Ffrench, M.P. is foreman of the Ros-
common Grand Jury. The High Sheriff, Major
Mahon, entertained the Judges and Grand Jury to
dinner.

The Conservatives have now seven seats in Ireland,
and lost but one, which they had last Parliament.
They have gained two in Dublin, two in Waterford,
one in Queen's County, one in Wicklow, and one in
Athlone, while they are only minus one at Kinsale;
and had they bestirred themselves in time, or rather
been aware of the "house and premises" question,
they might have had ere now an accession of twelve
more seats in the Irish constituency.

The annual expenditure of Great Britain and
Ireland exceeded the actual revenue, for the year
ended the 5th day of April, 1841, by the sum of
£1,851,997.

About four o'clock yesterday evening, a fine boy
about seven years of age, son to a tailor named Gar-
vey, in Mary-street, while fishing at the Long Dock,
fell into the river, when his only companion, a boy of
his own age, instead of immediately alarming the
persons on the quay, ran home to his parents with
the melancholy news. The body was found in half
an hour, but life was extinct.

Thomas Waller, Esq. of Finnoe, county Tipperary,
father of the late Assessor for Dublin, was recognised
at the coach-office in this city on Thursday, and
immediately a crowd of idle scoundrels saluted him
with a volley of hisses and groans, which they kept
up until the coach drove off. Mr. Waller merely
smiled, and took off his hat in acknowledgment.

That active and meritorious officer, Constable
Slattery, on Wednesday night, arrested Timothy
Morony, one of the armed party that attacked Mr.
John Croker's steward's house, at Ballinaguard, on
Sunday last, during divine service, and robbed it of
a gun and a case of pistols. He is fully identified,
and committed to the County gaol, to stand his trial
at the next Assizes.
