INQUEST.—Alderman Watson held an inquest at  
Barrington's Hospital on Monday, on the body of  
Michael Mourn, a tailor, who came by his death  
under the following circumstances, which clearly prove  
the melancholy results attendant on vice, immorality,  
and intemperance:—The first witness examined was  
William Donovan, a recruit belonging to the E.I.C.S.  
who deposed that he was in a brothel in Post-  
office lane, in this City, about two or three o'clock on  
Thursday morning last, and saw the deceased come  
in rather tipsy, and throw himself on a bed; he was  
not long there when a girl of the pave (Mary Molony)  
stood up and searched his pockets for money, but  
found nothing in them; in a few minutes after the  
Mistress of the apartment (Mary Meehan) entered,  
and asked Mourn had he any money, but he answered  
not, that he lost what he had outside; she told him  
"as you have no money, you have no business here,"  
whereupon he stood up and went away, but returned  
again for his hat, of which, together with his shoes  
and coat, he had been deprived before he was turned  
out; when deceased came back to the door, Mary  
Meehan went out against him, but immediately  
jumped in, and swore by "J——, he was dead."

This witness said he did not hear the man fall, nor  
know what happened him until *Jim Short* came up  
to bring the girls to an account about it. The  
next witness was Patrick Collins, a pensioner from the  
E. I. C. Artillery, but all he could state was, that he  
went into the *den* in a state of intoxication, and knew  
nothing of what happened until he, with four others  
were arrested by one of our vigilant Policemen, Acting-  
Constable Fury. *Jim Short*, the wretch, whom the  
first witness stated first intimated that the deceased  
was found lying almost dead in the hall, bore testi-  
mony to that effect, and said he believed the man was  
thrown down stairs, but on further examination it  
was elicited that the fellow was himself proprietor of  
the house in which the transaction happened, and  
had sixteen unfortunate Cyprians as tenants. Sir

Richard Franklin, M. D., examined the body, and  
deposed that at the time deceased was admitted into  
Hospital on Thursday, he laboured under the effects  
of several injuries, and symptoms of concussion and  
extravasation of blood on his brain, accompanied with  
incoherency and stupour, and that he died of rupture  
of the blood vessels of the brain. Margaret Knight,  
another of the frail sex, on being examined, stated  
that she saw deceased go into the house with Mary  
Meehan, and in some time after heard them scolding;  
he asked for his hat, but Mary Meehan refused to  
give it to him until he would pay for it; after this  
she heard him fall down stairs, and believes it was  
Mary Meehan threw him down; Bridget Meehan,  
sister to Mary, abused witness when she told her it  
was a shame to use any man in that way, and attempted  
to stab her with a knife. The sister-in-law of the  
unfortunate deceased, said he was only three weeks  
returned from England, where he buried his wife, and  
had three orphan children. The Magistrate said the  
particulars of this case, respecting the character of  
*Short*, and his abominable way of living, should not  
be lost sight of by the Petty Sessions, who would  
take another course of proceeding against him, but  
as to the subject matter for which the Jury were  
impanelled he was of opinion that sufficient evidence  
had been given to warrant them in coming to the  
conclusion that, the deceased was thrown down the  
stairs by Mary Meehan. The Jury returned a verdict

—"That Michael Mourn died in Barrington's Hos-  
pital on Sunday the 12th day of September, inst.,  
from the effects of concussion and rupture of the  
blood vessels of his brain, caused by having been  
thrown down stairs in a house of ill-fame in Post-  
office lane, in this City, early on the morning of the  
9th inst., by Mary Meehan," who has been fully  
committed to prison.

The Commander-in-Chief at Calcutta has sanctioned  
an exchange of duties between Assistant-Surgeon  
Bace, 26th, who was under orders for China, and  
Assistant-Surgeon Graydon, of the 50th, agreeable  
to the recommendation of the Inspector-General  
Hospitals at Bengal.

Lieutenant-Colonel J. Smith, of the 2d Native Light  
Cavalry, Madras, has been honourably acquitted  
of the charges preferred against him, and the proceedings  
of the court-martial have been confirmed by the  
Major-General commanding the army in chief.

Ensign Palmer's, 9th Regiment, resignation has  
been conditionally accepted by the Commander-in-  
Chief in India. The ensign is to retire from the  
service by the sale of his commission. At a general  
court-martial, held at Meerut, on the 24th May last,  
Private Timothy Shean, 9th Regt. was sentenced to  
seven years' transportation for the three-fold crime  
of desertion.

Capt. Horner, 55th has arrived from India on the  
years leave.

The recruits belonging to the Queen's forces sent  
tioned at Chinsurah, under the command of Capt.  
Astier, of the 62d Regt. have been ordered to proceed  
to the upper provinces of India.

The Orent, Captain Taylor, and Marquis of Hastings  
Captain Carr, from Sydney, had reached Madras with  
detachments of her Majesty's 50th Foot rescued from  
the Ferguson, which vessel was wrecked on the bar  
ren reef in Torres Straights upon the 27th of April.

A charitable subscription has been entered into  
the sufferers by this wreck.

The Rodney, 92, Captain R. Maunsell, C. B. has  
turned to Alexandria, August 17, from a cruise, and  
anchored outside with the Calcutta, where their pres-  
ence had excited some ill-feeling towards the British  
on the part of Melhemet Ali, who was at a loss to dis-  
cover the object they had in view, but it was reported  
they would take their departure for either Beyrout  
or Malta, in a day or two, or for the Dog River, on  
the coast of Syria. The boats of the Rodney, which
