

Lieut. Cahill and party, 91st, leave Cappawhite for Templemore, on the 1st October, and will be replaced by Capt. Gordon's company of same Regt. The *Indus*, 78, Capt. Sir J. Stirling, has arrived at Tunis.

The late Col. Leahy, 21st Fusiliers, has left 1000 acres prime land at Botany Bay, the title deeds of which were handed by the Court of Claims on the 21st April last to Messrs. Campbell, in trust, to sell.

Capt. Doyle O'Brien, 70th Regt. is appointed Major of Brigade at Chatham. The Adjutancy of the Garrison is dispensed with.

Col. Dundas, R. A. has laid the first stone of a Scotch church to cost £3,000, at Woolwich.

It is generally believed that circumstances have arisen which render it inexpedient to have two flags flying in the Mediterranean Fleet; and consequently Admiral Sir F. Mason, recently appointed, will not proceed to that station.

All officers on half-pay filling situations in the Navy are to wear the uniform of the situation they occupy, and not that of the rank they may hold in the Service.

All the Irish Revenue Cruisers returned to their stations on Saturday.

John Dillon, a seaman of the *Linnet* packet, is likely to obtain the title and estates of the Earldom of Roscommon.

The Earl Glengall has declined the honor of a Lord in Waiting on her Majesty.

Lord Elliott will not proceed to Dublin until after the adjournment of the House of Commons, which will be in about six weeks.

Lady Dover and her two sons, with her Ladyships mother, and Viscount Morpeth, are at Gowran Castle, county Kilkenny.

Mr. Vignoles, the Engineer, is now in this country and he has just completed a re-examination of the proposed lines of Railway from Dublin to Cork and Limerick, as originally laid out under the direction of the Government Commissioners.

The election of Sligo is fixed for Tuesday next, when Mr. Ffolett, the friend of Col. Perceval, will be turned by the Conservative interest.

The City Waterford Election Petition is the fifteenth order of presentation. The number of Electors stated to be disfranchised by the "house and premises" point is 369. The allegations of the petition are strictly confined to the house and premises point.

It is confidently rumoured that the promotion of Mr. Froy will shortly cause a vacancy in the representation of the University. Sergeant Jackson and Professor Longfield have already canvassed some of the electors, in anticipation of this event.

The Lady of the deceased Rev. Charles Waller, L. D. comes in for his property, which is £3,000, and £300 a year.

An investigation is to take place on to-morrow at an adjourned Petty Sessions into charges preferred against Constable M'Carthy, of the Constabulary, for a recent assault committed during the Kerry election.

Doctor White, Inspector of Prisons has returned to Dublin from his tour of inspection in England and Ireland, to see the plan of the institutions in that country.

Mr. Walker, County Surveyor, is about to be re-elected as Surveyor of the City Waterford at £75 a year.

On Monday last, as Pat, Cranne, and his two sons were conveying turf, in a boat, from a bog on the river side of the Shannon, a sudden squall arose, upset the boat. The man was drowned, but the other two clung to the boat, where they remained until assistance was afforded them.

A child, three years of age, the son of Mr. Thomas Mulhally, residing at Sunday's-Well, was accidentally drowned in the river Lee, yesterday.

On Thursday last, being the day on which the late Admiral of the Royal Cork Yacht Club Fleet, James Hugh Smith Barry, Esq. was married, the Club, in order to testify their respect on this occasion ordered their flag-posts, and fired a Vice-Admiral's salute of 17 guns, at 12 o'clock.

Mr. Magill, Esq. is elected Commissioner of the first Ballast Board.

Mr. Harrison, of Woodlawn, is appointed Physician to the Ballinascloe Workhouse.

Workhouses of Gort, Loughrea, and Ballinacorney are to be opened on the first November next, for the reception of the poor.

The Office Poor Law Guardians of the Tuam Union were elected on the 6th October.

The Rev. Nicholas Wilkinson acknowledges the receipt of an order for twenty pounds' worth of slates to be sent from the Dean and Chapter of Limerick, for the building of the new school-house in Glenasheen, county of Particles.

The Town of Outerard, County Galway, was illuminated on Thursday night, to welcome the return of the Rev. Dr. Kirwan, after an absence of nine months in England.

The Very Rev. Theobald Mathew preached on Sunday at Watergrass-hill, in aid of the funds of the Chapel and National School-house. He afterwards administered the pledge.

The Rev. Theobald Mathew will visit this City on the 14th of October, and administer the Temperance Pledge.

Bishop Coleridge, of Jamaica, will not again return to that island.

The Rev. Pat M'Manus is appointed Parish Priest of Louisburgh, County Mayo.

Miss O'Halaran, Dublin, Miss Buterly, county Louth, Miss Whealan, county Kildare, Miss Byrne, Kilkenny, and two lay sisters, took the veil at the Signa Convent, Drogheda, on Saturday last.

On Saturday morning last, the house of James Fitzgerald Copper, of Castletown, near Newcastle, was totally consumed with all the furniture, and £3 10s. in money, together with £16 worth of timber, two goats, two pigs, and a donkey. The accident occurred in consequence of the pigs bed taking fire, which was near the chimney, and which one of the pigs shoved into the fire.

A fire broke out on Saturday night, in the Oil and Colour Manufactory of Messrs. Wilson & Co., South Friary Lane, off Sullivan's Quay, Cork, but was subdued—before the greater portion of the property and concerns was destroyed. The premises were insured with the Patriotic Insurance Office for £1500.
