SUICIDE.—This day Alderman Crips held an inquest in William-street, on the body of John Thornton. alias Morevoe, a French teacher, when it appeared. that he came by his death the previous evening from the effects of a dose of Prussic Acid, administered by himself. The deceased was a tall athletic man, apparently about 60 years of age, and it is supposed that pecuniary difficulties prompted him to commit the fatal deed. He had some tuitions in this City, being a very excellent French scholar, and though he was supposed to be a Frenchman, it is understood that he was a Kerry man and had admitted so to some persons with whom he had previously lodged. Mr. Benjamin Garvey, one of his pupils, deposed that he visited him last evening, about half-past six o'clock, to receive a lesson, and noticed his manuer like that of a person disturbed in mind; he left the house between seven and eight, and did not see him again until this morning, when he was dead. John Fitzgerald, a shopman at Mr. Goodwin's stated, that the deceased was in the habit of occasionally resorting that establishment, and taking a glass of porter, and sometimes half a glass of rum; he went in there last night, at seven o'clock and called for half a pint of Cape wine, which he got, and carried away in a jug that he brought with him; witness observed nothing particular in his Johanna Guerin, demeanour on that occasion. a servant maid in the house where the unfortunate man lodged, on visiting his apartment at nine o'clock this morning went over to his bed, and saw him apparently sitting up, as if leaning on his arm, but on closer examination it was ascertained he was dead. Doctor Sir Richard Franklin and Surgeon Gore, on a post morten examination of the body, and contents of the stomach (which were subjected to the usual chemical tests) gave it as their opinion that death was caused by his taking a large quantity of Prussic Acid, sufficient to kill 50 men! Two small vials were found on a table, near deceased's bed, marked " Poison,'; and a razor, with which it is thought he had cut the string which bound the cork. One of the vials appeared to have been opened some time previous, and emptied of its contents, but the other was only opened for the melancholy occasion. and as they were seen in his room for some time past, there is little doubt but he had it in contemplation to put a period to his existence. There was no money found in his possession, nor did his trunk contain any value. A pawn ticket was taken from his pocket, by which it appeared that he pledged a coat for 14s. at the Monte de Piete the day before, and gave his name as Kearney. An old watch, a few articles of wearing apparel, some books, and some French mananuscripts, are all he has left behind. A gentleman present at the inquest said he heard that deceased had attempted twice before to put a period to his existence, while in London. The following verdict was returned-" That deceased came by his death from the effects of Prussic Acid, administered by himself."
