### INQUEST ON THE BODY OF JOHN O'NEILL.

On Saturday the Mayor proceeded to hold an  
inquest on the body of John O'Neill, at the school-  
room of Mrs. Hall's Alms House, Nicholas-street,  
where he lived as schoolmaster. He was Tiler to the  
Masonic Lodge, 271, and returning home, when he  
came by his death, it would appear, from having  
fallen while under the influence of liquor, and unable  
to rise from the awkward position he was in, perished  
before daylight, from the great inclemency of the  
night. A jury having been sworn, the following  
evidence was adduced:—

John Donohue sworn—Lives in Barrack-street;  
was going to his work this morning at seven o'clock,  
and was called by a woman who said, 'look at the  
dead man;' saw the deceased lying on his side in  
the channel opposite the Convent; one of his shoes  
was off; witness then called another man, who came  
to him, and they sent for the Police.

Mary Lynch sworn.—Lives in Flag-lane; was  
going home with her husband about 12 o'clock, last  
night, and met the deceased at Mr. Kirby's house,  
at the head of Pump-lane; saw him fall; her hus-  
band went over and raised him up; he got a heavy  
fall; deceased appeared to be very tipsy; he looked  
foolish, and began to move his stick about in a very  
strange manner; they met a boy near Newgate-lane,  
and he came across to the head of Pump-lane, and  
helped her husband to take him up.

Michael Lynch sworn—Is a tailor; was coming  
home from work at 12 o'clock; heard the man fall at  
the corner of Pump-lane; a boy named Duhigg called  
witness to go and raise the man up; the boy raised  
him up, his lip was cut and bleeding; the deceased  
then went on as far as Kelly's-lane and witness heard  
him fall there again; witness remarked to his wife  
that he was very drunk, and he appeared to be so.

Mr. John William H. Haynes sworn—Knew the  
deceased, he was tiler to a masonic lodge which was  
held at Swinburn's last night; at half-past 9 witness  
ordered him a tumbler of punch, and at a quarter  
past 11 he told him to go home, which witness be-  
lieves he did as he did not see him after, and he was  
at that time sober; he got a half-crown that night as  
his dues.

Police Constable Hardy sworn—Was called upon  
from the gaol guard by a man named Collins, at 7  
o'clock this morning; saw deceased lying on his left  
side; went for a car to bring him to Barrington's hos-  
pital; tried his pockets, there was no money in them;  
he was lying in the channel, and stopped the water  
on himself so that it was running over him; it would
